# TIPS FOR FIRST-YEAR STUDENTS

## Use DiggerNet (Events) and the Career Day Guide and Addendum to:

- Learn about the companies attending the Career Fair
- Locate the booths for companies you are interested in – plan your route
- Get the Career Day App (Search *Symplicity Jobs and Career App*) for most up-to-date information and electronic booth map

## Plan your outfit for Career Day:

- Business professional attire is recommended
- Dressing appropriately will make a great first impression

## Prepare your resume:

- Update your major (if you have one) and graduation date (contact Career Center to update in DiggerNet)
- Add any recent college activities
- Get your resume reviewed by the Career Center; attend a workshop or Rapid Resume Review event (all workshop dates/locations listed in DiggerNet)
- Print multiple copies to hand out to employers at Career Day

## Give yourself plenty of time! Be aware that:

- This is a well-attended event; there may be lines
- Employers may take occasional breaks (especially for lunch)

## Don't be discouraged:

- Many companies don't hire first-year undergraduate students, yet that doesn't mean you can't talk to them!
- Give your elevator pitch and express your interest for the company; recruiters may remember you, which will increase your chances next year
- Gather information to make yourself a better candidate next year
- Use this Career Fair as a chance to practice approaching booths and talking with employers

## Even if you don't plan on speaking to any companies, you can:

- Walk around and observe the atmosphere
- Watch other students interact with employers
- Take any free items that companies offer
