Consideration was given to the possible acquisition by the Colorado School of Mines of the tract of approximately twenty acres near the Southeast corner of the City of Golden, now owned by the State Industrial School and offered for sale. President Parker stated that according to press reports the State Purchasing Agent had received bids for this property and that the high bid was \$3,339.00. It was the consensus of the Board that, in view of the possibility of future utilization of this site for a County Court House in order to permit the release of the option on Pioneer Park now held by Jefferson County, the sale of this Industrial School property to private interests would seriously jeopardize the possible acquisition of Pioneer Park by the School of Mines. Upon motion by Mr. Thomas. seconded by Mr. Vanderwilt, and unanimously carried. President Parker was instructed to request the Governor either to defer the sale of this property pending negotiations between Jefferson County, the City of Golden, and the School of Mines or to authorise the sale of this property to the School of Mines at a price equal to the highest bid received at the last offering.

The meeting then adjourned.
