

Consideration was given to the possible acquisition by the Colorado School of Mines of the tract of approximately twenty acres near the Southeast corner of the City of Golden, now owned by the State Industrial School and offered for sale. President Parker stated that according to press reports the State Purchasing Agent had received bids for this property and that the high bid was \$3,339.00. It was the consensus of the Board that, in view of the possibility of future utilization of this site for a County Court House in order to permit the release of the option on Pioneer Park now held by Jefferson County, the sale of this Industrial School property to private interests would seriously jeopardize the possible acquisition of Pioneer Park by the School of Mines. Upon motion by Mr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Vanderwilt, and unanimously carried, President Parker was instructed to request the Governor either to defer the sale of this property pending negotiations between Jefferson County, the City of Golden, and the School of Mines or to authorize the sale of this property to the School of Mines at a price equal to the highest bid received at the last offering.

The meeting then adjourned.

The following is an excerpt from the minutes of the special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines held in Golden, Colorado, on June 20, 1947:

"The proposal by Mr. Leonard De Lue for the sale of Lots 1 to 6, Block 102, South Side of Clear Creek, at a price of \$5,200, or Lots 1 to 6, Block 102, and Lots 5 and 6, Block 87 at a price of \$45,000 was considered. Upon motion by Mr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Vanderwilt, and unanimously carried, President Parker was authorized to offer Mr. De Lue \$5,200 for Lots 1 to 6, Block 102, or \$42,500 for Lots 1 to 6, Block 102 and Lots 5 and 6, Block 87."

The following is an excerpt from the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines held in Golden, Colorado, on July 11, 1947:

"President Parker stated that since the last meeting of the Board he had negotiated with Mr. Leonard De Lue and, in accordance with instructions from the Board, had agreed to purchase Lots 1 to 6, Block 102, South Side of Clear Creek, and the lots and house designated as 1722 Illinois Street, with certain furnishings as specified in Mr. De Lue's letter dated July 1, 1947, for a total price of \$42,500. Upon motion by Mr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Bowen, and unanimously carried, these negotiations were confirmed and President Parker was instructed to have the Attorney General examine the title to this property and upon approval of the title to accept deeds in proper form."

AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT

HA(V-5166)mph-1
Project COLO-V-5166
(Formerly COLO-V-5153)
Golden, Colorado

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into as of the 1st day of April, 1947, by the United States of America, acting by and through the Federal Public Housing Authority, herein called the "FPHA", and the Colorado School of Mines, Golden, Colorado, an educational institution organized and existing under the laws of the State of Colorado, herein called the "local body";

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the parties hereto under date of June 21, 1946, executed Contract No. HA(V-5153)mph-1 covering the use of 60 family dwelling units for veteran occupancy in the City of Golden, Colorado; and

WHEREAS, the 20 family dwelling units allocated to the City of Golden, Colorado, under Contract No. HA(V-5155)moh-1 dated June 21, 1946, have been voluntarily released by the City and are to be assigned to the Colorado School of Mines under a combined contract, No. HA(V-5166)mph-1.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Section 1. That the project and the contract number of the original contract between the parties shall now be designated as Project No. COLO-V-5166 and Contract No. HA(V-5166)mph-1, with the effective date thereof April 1, 1947.

Section 2. That section 1.01 of the original contract is hereby amended to include 20 additional family dwelling units heretofore allocated to the City of Golden, Colorado, making the total number of temporary dwelling accommodations allocated to the local body 80 family dwelling units, with the express stipulation that the additional 20 units shall not be limited solely to occupancy by student veterans.

Section 3. All the provisions contained in the original contract and the amendment thereto executed as of January 22, 1947, shall, in all other respects, remain in full force and effect.

We are enclosing two copies of Library of Congress List No. 6, Surplus Books for Veterans, to be used as order blanks, one copy to be filled out and mailed as per instructions in the folder, the other copy to be filled out as a duplicate of the original order and kept in your file. The Veterans Administration is not authorized to purchase books from other sources when the books on the government owned surplus textbook list are the same as or similar to the books furnished by your book store and can be used in any courses in which your institution has veterans enrolled.

You will note that the contract is made effective beginning December 4, 1946 and ending May 1, 1947 which is for the purpose of providing a means of payment to your institution for services rendered in the issuing of government owned surplus textbooks from December 4, 1946 on. Your contract for the education and training of veterans will be renewed as of May 1, 1947, at which time provisions will be made in the renewal agreement, for the continuation of the education and training of veterans, to take care of this service.

When these contracts are received in this office signed by your authorized representative, they will be executed by the authorized representative of Veterans Administration as indicated therein, and a copy will be returned to you for your filed.
