The minutes of the meeting of April 13, 1951 were read and approved.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the record of Mr. H. Dean Burdick and recommended that he be appointed Director of Admissions for the academic year beginning September 1, 1951 and ending August 31, 1952 at a salary of \$4,440. The Board approved the appointment and authorized the issuance of a contract to Mr. Burdick.

In accordance with the request of the previous meeting, President Vanderwilt reviewed the information he had gathered about Colonel Wendell W. Fertig. He recommended that Colonel Fertig be granted the honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering. It was moved by Dr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Harrison and unanimously passed, that the honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering be granted to Colonel Fertig at the Commencement exercises on May 25, 1951.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting and presented the following financial statements, which were approved and accepted: Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements No. 10 for the period ending April 30, 1951; the Balance Sheet as of April 30, 1951; the Dining Hall Statement of Profit and Loss for the month of April; the Canteen Statement of Profit and Loss for the month of April; and the statement of Mill Levy Building Funds for the period ending April 30, 1951.

The Board then recessed and the members, together with President Vanderwilt and Mr. Steinhauer, had lunch at the School Dining Hall.

After lunch the members of the Board accompanied by President Vanderwilt and Mr. Steinhauer conducted an inspection of the lots in Blocks 49 and 64, known as the Quaintance lots, located west and southwest of the residence owned by the School at 1520 Maple Street. Then a visit was made to the graduate student offices on the fourth floor of Berthoud Hall, after which the Board returned to the President's Office to resume the meeting.

Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the status of the application for funds for faculty and student housing under the Housing Act of 1950 and reported that the application would be submitted as soon as information requested from the Attorney General's office had been furnished.

Mr. Steinhauer then left the meeting.

The Board entered a discussion concerning the possible value of the Quaintance lots that had been inspected immediately following luncheon. It was the consensus of the Board that these lots would add considerable value to the ground already held by the School, and President Vanderwilt was authorized

- (1) to obtain an option on the lots at as low a price as possible but, if necessary, to accept an option at the asked price of \$500 per lot; and,
- (2) to arrange with The Colorado State Planning Commission to approve the purchase of such lots.

The proposed meeting of the Board of Trustees with Mr. Thomas A. Gonser, consultant on public relations and development, was reviewed and the time of meeting, 10:00 A.M., May 17, 1951, at the University Club in Denver was confirmed.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the information obtained about School ownership of fraternity houses as had been requested by Mr. Thomas at the last meeting of the Board, and explained that Mr. Steinhauer had written letters to obtain such information from various sources but that he had not received replies from all of the letters sent and would make a more detailed report later.

Mr. Thomas called attention to the fact that the monthly statement for the building funds presented by Mr. Steinhauer indicated that from 1952 to 1957 a sizable sum would be available for additional buildings, and that he felt that this made it desirable to consider the initiation of plans for one large or two small buildings with consideration being given to a library, a metallurgy building, or some other building needed by the School. It was agreed that it would be very undesirable to have any substantial balance in the Building Fund for which plans for its use were not ready, and President Vanderwilt was instructed to have a talk, without making commitments, with Mr. Robert K. Fuller relative to the capacity of Mr. Fuller's staff and his thinking on terms for a new contract, and to determine whether he would be interested and whether his staff and office facilities would make it feasible for him to consider additional work.

The meeting then adjourned at 5:00 P.M.

President Vanderwilt read a memorandum by Mr. Steinhauer regarding the 1951-52 Athletic Department budget which showed an anticipated deficit of \$4,372.98 and Mr. Steinhauer's suggested remedy to charge out-of-state travel expenses to state funds. The remaining deficit of about \$1,600 was considered less serious because it might be made up by ticket sales if a favorable season developed. The Board accepted Mr. Steinhauer's recommendation.

President Vanderwilt reviewed tentative recommendations that had been presented by Mr. Steinhauer for an audit of the school accounts by an independent certified public accountant. The problem in arranging for an audit by independent accountants arises from the fact that the charge for such work might not be approved by the State Auditor. Preliminary discussions with the State Auditor had indicated that it might be less difficult to get approval of consulting fees for a study of auditing methods or procedure, but President Vanderwilt explained that Mr. Steinhauer was more interested in having accounting service to audit the books. The Board sympathized with and approved Mr. Steinhauer's desires and indicated a willingness to accept his final recommendations when ready. Considerable discussion followed on the question of auditing, and it was the feeling of the Board that the State Auditor's office should provide at state expense an independent audit of the type that Mr. Steinhauer desired inasmuch as such audits were being made, according to reports, at other state institutions of higher learning. It was felt that possibly these institutions by joint action could present their problem to the proper officials in the Statehouse in order that a uniform course of action might be worked out. Final action was not taken by the Board as to the procedure to be followed, but it was recommended that the matter be taken up for discussion at a meeting of the Association of Presidents of the Institutions of Higher Learning of the State of Colorado.

President Vanderwilt presented the summary form of the revised 1951-52 budget. Attention was given to the estimated balance of June 30, 1952, which represented the only item remaining for contingencies. The revised budget represented a decrease of \$21,794.18 as compared to the budget figures presented to the State Controller in October of 1951. This decrease is the difference between the amount of the Legislative appropriation and the amount requested in the original budget. In revising the budget the amounts for maintenance and operation, and capital outlay were decreased to make up the difference. The revised budget as presented was approved by the Board.

President Vanderwilt called attention to the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. George W. Salzer who had been Head of the Department of Descriptive Geometry and Engineering Drawing. President Vanderwilt presented with his recommendation the name of John M. Coke for appointment to the vacancy with a salary of \$5,000, effective September 1, 1951. The recommended salary of \$5,000 represents an increase of \$160 over Professor Coke's present salary and is the minimum amount for heads of non-degree-granting departments. The recommendation, President Vanderwilt explained, has the support of Dean Signer and is based on the following considerations:

- (1) Professor Coke has a commendable record of twenty-three years on the faculty of the Colorado School of Mines.
- (2) He is now senior ranking member of the Department of Descriptive Geometry and Engineering Drawing.
- (3) During the past few years he has assumed considerable responsibility in the administration of his department.
- (4) He holds an advanced degree, Master of Science.
- (5) He has served willingly and effectively on numerous faculty committees.
- (6) There is good reason to believe that
 Professor Coke is well qualified to assume
 the responsibilities as Head of the Department of Descriptive Geometry and Engineering
 Drawing.

President Vanderwilt's recommendation was unanimously approved and accepted by the Board.

created in the library by the retirement of Miss Mary E. Hoyt on August 31, 1951, in accordance with the retirement policy adopted by the Board of Trustees in 1947. President Vanderwilt explained that the Faculty Library Committee, Dean Signer, and others were unanimous in their feeling that a man should be sought for this job. The present size of the student body, the growth of the library over the past years and the expected growth in the future, and the plans under consideration for preliminary studies by an architect for a new library building seem to require a person with a broad experience in library administration. With these considerations in mind, President Vanderwilt stated that he felt that to obtain a man to direct the library as the needs were visualized for the future and also to actively participate in the planning of the new library, it would be desirable to elevate the rank and salary of the

librarian to that comparable with the rank and salary of the head of a non-degree-granting department. President Vanderwilt explained that several men had been considered who had indicated an interest in the position, and one person in particular had been found who seemed to be an excellent prospect. He is Mr. Raymond R. Dickison who is presently employed as assistant director of the library at the University of Florida. Mr. Dickison has the A.B. degree, with a major in chemistry, from Colorado College; the M.S. degree, with a major in chemistry, from Penn State; and the B.S. degree, with a major in library science from Western Reserve College. He had had six years in library work at Penn State before going to the University of Florida where he has served four years. He is originally from Colorado, and his parents live in Colorado Springs. He wishes to return to this state. While visiting in July with his parents in Colorado Springs, he came to Golden for a personal interview. He left a very favorable impression with Dean Signer and President Vanderwilt. Mr. Dickison indicated an interest in the opportunity offered here, and it is believed that he would accept an offer in the range of \$5,000 or slightly more. These considerations were taken into account, President Vanderwilt stated, in making the recommendation regarding the rank to be given to the man in charge of the library and, if the Board were willing to accept the recommendation, he would further recommend making an offer to Mr. Dickison in order to obtain his services. Dr. Parker stated that the desirability of the eventual appointment of a man as librarian had been considered from time to time, and he felt it was a wise move to try to obtain a person with the qualifications Mr. Dickison seemed to have. Dr. Parker expressed the opinion that a higher salary was justified for such a man, and therefore he recom-mended that the position be classified to the rank and salary comparable to that of the head of a non-degreegranting department.

After a brief discussion, it was moved by Dr. Parker that the person in charge of the library should have the rank and salary comparable to the rank and salary of the head of a non-degree-granting department and, further, that President Vanderwilt be authorized to offer the position to Mr. Dickison at a salary equal to the salary that Mr. Dickison was receiving in his present position. The motion was seconded by Mr. Harrison and unanimously approved.

On returning to the meeting, after having excused himself to accept a long-distance telephone call, Trustees raising President Vanderwilt's salary from the present rate of \$10,200 to \$10,800, the raise to be expressed his appreciation for the action taken by the Board and accepted the expressed implication of confidence as equal if not more important than the monetary benefit.

President Vanderwilt was Instructed by Mr. Thomas to show in these minutes action taken by the Board of effective September 1, 1951. President Vanderwilt

An agreement between the Colorado School of Mines and the Colorado State Highway Department was reviewed. This agreement granted access, restricted to school use, to the new highway at a point opposite the ball park. President Vanderwilt explained that the Highway Department was adamant in its stand to limit access to school use but that this limitation had certain advantages in that public access could interfere with the effective use of the land for school purposes. The access stipulated in the contract would consist of sixteen-foot gates and culverts installed at no expense to the school. The agreement made June 18, 1951 by and between the Colorado State Highway Department and the Colorado School of Mines to provide the required access between the Colorado School of Mines property on the north and south sides of the Colorado State Highway Department Freeway in the vicinity of Station 165 of Project FOO5-3(5) was accepted by the Board and signed by Er. Lester C. Thomas, President of the Board of Trustoes.

President Vanderwilt presented a lease between The Military Department, State of Colorado, for benefit of The Colorado National Guard, lessor, and the Colorado School of Mines, lessee, covering specific rooms and the use of certain facilities in the Armory Building from the first day of June 1951 until the thirty-first day of May 1952, at a monthly rental of \$100 payable in advance. This lease was approved unanimously by the Board and was executed on behalf of the Colorado School of Mines by Mr. Lester C. Thomas, President of the Board of Trustees, and Mr. Max W. Bowen, Secretary of the Board.

President Vanderwilt presented parchment diplomas for Boris Stanley Voukovitch, Geological Engineer; Bindeshwari Narain Sinha, Doctor of Science; Juan Francisco Villarreal, Petroleum Engineer; and Wayne Eugene McNeely, Petroleum Engineer, all of whom graduated on May 25, 1951. These diplomas were signed by Mr. Lester C. Thomas, President of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Max W. Bowen, Secretary of the Board of Trustees, and President Vanderwilt.

A brief review was given by President Vanderwilt of information obtained by Mr. Steinhauer on school ownership of fraternity houses. The answers received from national offices of the several fraternities represented on the campus were generally favorable but suggestions had been received to take up the matter with the local house associations of the respective fraternities on campus, and Mr. Steinhauer was now getting in touch with these associations for further information.

The Board then recessed for lunch at the School Dining Hall after which it reconvened in President Vanderwilt's office.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the situation relative to the applications received from men interested in the public relations and development work under consideration at the Colorado School of Mines. He explained that about twenty applications had been received but for the most part the records of applicants show experience limited to or concentrated in news information or publications work. Some of the applicants have specialized in promotional work, and only a few seem to have engaged in the work involving long-range development that would be suited to the problems of the Colorado School of Mines. In the latter group are three applications, from John Newton Baker from the State University of Florida, Edward M. Brown from the University of Dayton, and G. D. Wimpress from Whittier College, California.

The work of Mr. Wimpress at Whittier College, President Vanderwilt continued, seems to parallel closely the general pattern envisioned as desirable for a long-range development program here, and for this reason he recommended Mr. Wimpress for first consideration, subject to a personal interview. In the discussion that followed, considerable thought was given to the advantages and disadvantages of employing a man like Mr. Wimpress, age 29, against paying a higher salary for a man somewhat older and with more experience. In view of the school's requirements and the strong supporting letters received in behalf of Mr. Wimpress, it was agreed that a personal interview with him was justified. On motion made by Dr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Harrison and unanimously passed, President Vanderwilt was authorized to arrange for Mr. Wimpress to come to Golden, with expenses paid, for such an interview.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting and explained the status of the applications that had been made for loans under the Housing Act of 1950 for faculty housing and student dormitories. He stated that the representatives of the government were optimistic concerning each of the applications that had been presented if the school's equity could be increased to approximately 30% of each of the two loans requested. In setting up the application for faculty housing, eight apartments consisting of two-bedroom and three-bedroom units were used, and in setting up the loan for a dormitory, a capacity of 132 students was used. Considerable discussion followed as to whether a smaller dormitory might not be more desirable in order to make financing easier, and the question was also raised as to whether it would be possible to keep a dormitory unit with a capacity of 132 students fully occupied. As to financing, Mr. Steinhauer explained that if the Board were willing to assign revenue from Mines Park to secure a loan for a dormitory, he thought it might be possible to get favorable action without raising equity money.

In view of the high cost of nearly \$3,200 per bed for a dormitory, the problem of securing additional equity money, and the existing differences of opinion as to the most desirable size for a dormitory, the Board took no action on the loan applications, and President Vanderwilt was instructed to arrange to have Mr. Steinhauer explain to the government representatives why the prompt action they desired could not be forthcoming.

Mr. Thomas inquired about the Quaintance lots west of Maple Street. Upon hearing that Mr. Quaintance was still interested in making a complicated deal, the Board instructed President Vanderwilt to inform Mr. Quaintance that the Board did not wish to consider a deal involving an exchange with a faculty member as suggested by him and that the Board was willing to offer a maximum of \$500 a lot for the six lots. President Vanderwilt was further instructed to have inquiries made of the Attorney General regarding the authority and problems that might be involved in condemning ground needed by the Colorado School of Mines.

Mr. Robert K. Fuller entered the meeting at 3:00 P.M. to present and review the bids received on the laboratory equipment for the Chemistry Building. The bids, which were received on June 29, 1951, are listed below:

American Fire Clay Company \$146,171.00 American School Supply Co. 155,514.00 Platt Rogers, Inc. 132,791.00

Upon motion by Mr. Bowen, seconded by Mr. Stockmar and unanimously passed, the low bid of \$132,791 by Platt Rogers, Inc. was accepted. The contract was signed on behalf of the Colorado School of Mines by Mr. Lester C. Thomas, President of the Board of Trustees, and Mr. Ted P. Stockmar, Assistant Secretary of the Board.

Mr. Fuller reviewed the results of his conferences with The Colorado State Planning Commission on terms and conditions of the new contract for architectural services for the studies desired by the Board of Trustees for a metallurgy building and a library.

Mr. Fuller stated that the Planning Commission was reluctant to enter into a contract for more than one building at a time. He reviewed the talks that had been held regarding fees but had no specific suggestions to offer for a contract to make the preliminary studies that were necessary before a decision could be made by the Board as to which building should be built first.

Mr. Fuller was requested to continue his conferences with the Planning Commission and to present a proposal with his recommendation as soon as possible.

The meeting adjourned at 4:30 P.M.
