The minutes of the special meeting of April 14, 1952 were read and approved.

President Vanderwilt presented a Certificate of Graduation for Vincent Louis Denunzio who received an Engineer of Mines degree on May 18, 1923. This Certificate was signed by L. C. Thomas, President of the Hoard of Trustees; Max W. Bowen, Secretary of the Board of Trustees; and John W Vanderwilt, President of the School.

President Vanderwilt presented the list of seniors and graduate students recommended for graduation on May 29, 1952.

Mr. Thomas reviewed the contracts for a new library and metallurgy building with Fuller, Fuller, and Fuller, Architects, and explained that the governor had considered the base rate of 6% not satisfactory. The governor was of the opinion that because the base rate of 6% was more or less standard, a contract for 6% might cause other architects to request increases also. The rate of Fuller, Fuller, and Fuller's contract being justified on the basis of extra services, it was the governor's suggestion that a new contract be drawn specifying a base rate of 6% plus an extra fee of 1/2% for extra services as specified in the contract. In accordance with the governor's suggestion, the old contract dated September 27, 1951 and specifying 65% base rate was withdrawn and a new contract of same date had been prepared by Mr. Robert K. Fuller. The contract, according to Mr. Fuller, had been reviewed with Mr. Ross Brown, Executive Assistant to Governor Thornton, and the the Planning Commission; and it was Mr. Fuller's belief that this contract would be acceptable to each of the officials in the state house whose signature was required. Mr. Thomas stated that he felt the new contract provided the same compensation to the architect as the old contract, that it provided the same protection to the school, and that he recommended its approval by the Board. Thereupon, it was moved by Dr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Bowen, that the new contract be approved and that Mr. Thomas as President of the Board of Trustees and Mr. Stockmar as Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign said contract. The motion was unanimously passed.

President Vanderwilt presented and reviewed the application of Mr. Lute J. Parkinson for the position of Head of Department of Mining Engineering to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Professor C. W. Livingston. In the discussion that followed, President Vanderwilt referred to receiving a number of supporting letters, and members of the Board discussed the advantage to the school of having a man with the wide experience and high reputation in the mining profession as head of the department. It was felt that Mr. Parkinson's somewhat limited experience in teaching and the educational field would be more than offset by his wide experience, his personality, and his natural aptitude for dealing with people. It was the general consensus of the Board that this was an unusual opportunity for the school. President Vanderwilt stated that Mr. Parkinson's application had been fully discussed with Dean Signer and that he joined with Dean Signer in recommending Mr. Parkinson's appointment. Thereupon, the Board unanimously approved Ar. Parkinson's appointment and President Vanderwilt was authorized to so notify Mr. Parkinson.

President Vanderwilt presented for the consideration of the Board the following resolution adopted by unanimous action by the faculty on May 8, 1952:

WHEREAS, the standing of the Colorado School of Mines has suffered great harm as the cumulative result of past Senior Days.

- (1) as a contributor of mineral engineers to industry,
- (2) as a recommended institution of higher learning for state high school graduates,
- (3) with the state legislature and Colorado taxpayer upon whom it depends for its support.
- (h) and with the community and the general public;

WHEREAS, the steady deterioration of the studentfaculty relationships is a direct result of indignities
and public humiliation imposed at the kangaroo court;
and of widely distributed, libelous, and obscene
material printed in the Senior Paper; and whereas repeated past efforts of Administration, Faculty, and
members of previous graduating classes to eliminate
the undesirable features of Senior Day have proved
ineffective:

BE IT THEREFORE RESCIVED, That Senior Day and all similar activities be completely abolished, that this resolution be implemented by a letter from the President of the Colorado School of Mines to all students, parents of students, alumni, and faculty, to the effect that Senior Day is abolished as of September 15, 1952; that students who willfully fail to comply with this regulation shall be expelled and shall not be graduated from the Colorado School of Mines.

In the discussion that followed, it be unanimously agreed that Senior Day as it is now known should be abolished. However, final decision was not reached as to the most effective procedure. Consideration was given to the possibilities of (1) seniors being encouraged to work out a plan and present this plan for approval of the school; (2) terms and conditions for a Senior Day being specifically set forth in writing and that the seniors be given one more opportunity to have a Senior Day that would be acceptable to the school, the faculty the administration, and the Board of Trustees. The general consensus, however, seemed to be the abuses of Senior Day could not be corrected short of complete abolishment of Senior Day as such. It was felt that before a final decision could be reached, a meeting of the Board of a representative group of the faculty be held, and President Vanderwilt was instructed to arrange such a meeting as soon as possible, preferably with not more than six or eight members of the faculty.

The meeting then adjourned and the members of the Board and President Vanderwilt went to lunch in the Dining Hall.

During lunch Dr. Parker asked permission to raise the question concerning the granting of a medal for Distinguished Achievement to him by the Board of Trustees. He stated that Mr. Stockmar, on instruction from the Board, had discussed this question with him

and although he appreciated the feeling of the Board and felt highly complimented, none the less he honestly felt that he should not accept the award because of his relatively recent appointment to the Board of Trustees. After reviewing the possible criticism that might come from various sources, Mr. Stockmar stated that it was his conclusion that not much criticism would develop anywhere. Upon a motion by Mr. Harrison, seconded by Mr. Bowen and supported by Mr. Stockmar and Mr. Thomas, it was decided that the medal for Distinguished Achievement be presented to Dr. Ben H. Parker at the Commencement exercises on May 29, 1952.

After lunch the meeting resumed in the President's office.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting and presented the monthly reports: Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements No. 10 as of April 30, 1952; the Balance Sheet as of April 30, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense for the Canteen and Dining Hall for April, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense for the Dining Hall, March 26 through April 26, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense for the Canteen for April, 1952; the Statements of Income and Expense for Mines Park, Prospector Park and Veterans Housing for April, 1952; the Mill Levy Building Fund as of April 30, 1952; the Special Building Fund as of April 30, 1952; and the Trial Balance as of April 30, 1952 for the 1951-52 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Incorporated.

The problem of attempting payment of supply vouchers so as to benefit by the ten-day and thirty-day discounts was reviewed by Mr. Steinhauer. He explained that the question had been raised by Mr. Noonan's office and that in his opinion only two alternatives were possible: one, to have the law changed which required the signatures of two members of the Board; and two, for the Board to sign vouchers in blank - a procedure which he could not recommend. It was the feeling of the Board that neither alternative would be sceeptable. Mr. Thomas suggested that Mr. Steinhauer discuss the situation with the companies concerned and see if arrangements could not be made for the school to get the benefit of these discounts even though the processing of the payment of supply vouchers did not permit the prompt payment ordinarily required for benefit of the discount.

President Vanderwilt reviewed a letter dated April 29, 1952 received from Mr. James A. Noonan, State Controller, containing a quotation from an opinion of the Attorney General of March 11, 1952 which prohibits the pledging of income from debt free projects for financing other like projects. Until this opinion is reviewed, or until the statutes are amended, it would not be possible to refinance housing in Mines Park as had been planned. This was the opinion given to Mr. Steinhauer by attorneys for investment houses in Denver. Mr. Stockmar suggested that an inquiry be made of Mr. Noonan and possibly the Attorney General to determine whether their attitude would be favorable or otherwise in the formulation of a law which would permit pledging of existing housing facilities toward financing additional units.

Mr. Stockmar asked to be excused because of an appointment in Denver and left the meeting.

Mr. Steinhauer presented a request that he had received for rental of the school football bleachers for use during the summer at a rodeo program near Sullivan. It was the feeling of the Board that inasmuch as the bleachers were paid for by tax funds, their use

was limited like other equipment of the school for functions directly connected with the school. The request for rental of the football bleachers was refused.

Mr. Steinhauer left the meeting at this time.

Mr. Robert K. Fuller entered the meeting at 2:20 P.M. to review the proposed plans for construction of a pilot plant in connection with the Petroleum Building. He explained that it would be desirable and he felt that it was within the terms of the contract to arrange for the construction of this unit as a change order under the present contract for the Petroleum Building. The proposed plans for the pilot unit and the manner for handling it under a change order was unanimously approved by members of the Board.

President Vanderwilt next reviewed the administration of Alumni Association Scholarships. The scholarships, ten in numer, had been granted by the Board of Trustees to the Alumni Association. In the past it was the responsibility of the Alumni Association to recommend candidates for these scholarships. In recent years, the responsibility of selecting candidates for the Alumni Association Scholarships has fallen more and more on the shoulders of Coach Fritz Brennecke because of lack of organized support on the part of the Alumni Association. The Scholarship Committee has recommended that consideration be given by the Board of Trustees to allowing these scholarships to be awarded on recommendation of the Director of Athletics as a regular procedure. It was the consensus of the Board that it would be desirable to continue the administration of the Alumni Association Scholarships as originally planned, that is that recommendations for appointment to the scholarships be made by the Alumni Association because this procedure would tend to retain and stimulate interest of alumni groups. However, the Board felt a review should be made by representative groups of the Alumni Association, and that it would be interested particularly in the recommendation of Coach Fritz Brennecke as to the most effective procedure for utilizing the Alumni Association Scholarships. President Vanderwilt was instructed to provide this information at a later meeting of the Board.

The desirability of the purchase of the S. M. Harris property at 1530 Maple Street in Golden was discussed. This preperty is adjacent to and south of the Eudaley property purchased by the school a little over a year ago. Mr. Harris is leaving Golden and therefore desires to sell the house. The original asking price was \$18,000 which later was reduced to \$16,100. An appraisal made by Mr. John C. Burt of Golden places a top value of \$15,000 on the property. The building is quite old and, according to the appraisal report, in a poor state of repair and will require considerable expense to bring it into serviceable condition, according to Mr. Burt's appraisal. The property has a 70 ft. frontage on Maple Street and a depth of 188 ft. on the northerly side and a depth of 118 ft. on the southerly side, being bounded on the southwest by an irrigation ditch. The ground covers approximately one and one-half city lots. It was the unanimous feeling of the Board that the location of this property with respect to property already owned by the School made it desirable to purchase the property, if possible, and President Vanderwilt was instructed to negotiate with Mr. Harris to obtain an option at the best price possible and report back to the Board.

President Vanderwilt reviewed a request that had been received from the Federal Bureau of Investigation for use of certain Colorado School of Mines facilities in the event of an emergency which would render untenable the Denver headquarters of the Bureau. After a brief discussion of the request, President Vanderwilt was instructed to notify the Federal Bureau of Investigation that the Board would be ready at all times to cooperate with the government, but that it felt that nothing was to be gained by making firm commitments for unpredictable situations which might develop in the future.

At the close of the meeting of April 14, the Board visited Engineering Hall and reviewed the plans for renovation for use of the Mathematics Department. It was the consensus of the Board that the tenative plans prepared by Mr. Kelly were satisfactory except for removal of the wood wainscoting and replacing the existing frame sash and casings with metal sash. No final action having been taken by the Board, Fresident Vanderwilt requested the approval of the Board for the renovation of Engineering Hall with the two exceptions referred to above. On motion by Mr. Harrison, seconded by Mr. Bowen, it was unanimously passed that Engineering Hall be renovated for the Department of Mathematics as outlined by Mr. Kelly in his communication dated March 13, 1952 with the exceptions of removal of wood wainscoting and replacement of existing frame sash and castings with metal sash.

President Vanderwilt read for the information of the Board a letter from Mr. C. E. Dobbin expressing his appreciation to the Board of Trustees for wishing to confer upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering at the Commencement exercises on May 29, 1952. Mr. Dobbin said that he accepted this honor with a deep sense of gratefulness and that he would attend the Commencement.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the applications of three men for the newly created position of Editor of the Office of Public Information which would be under the supervision of Mr. Wimpress. Mr. Wimpress had received several applications and it was his recommendation that Mr. Jack Harris be appointed. President Vanderwilt stated that he supported the recommendation of Mr. Wimpress that the appointment of Mr. J. S. Harris be approved by the Board at a salary of Sh,000 for twelve months, beginning September 1, 1952. The appointment was unanimously approved by the Board and President Vanderwilt was authorized to submit a regular contract to Mr. S. J. Harris as Editor of the Office of Public Information at a salary of Sh,000 for twelve months.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:20 P.M.

# SUGGESTED RESOLUTION TO BE PASSED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES MAY 9, 1952 GOLDEN, COLORADO

In answer to a request from the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the use of Colorado School of Mines facilities in the event of an armed attack on Denver, it is hereby moved:

- l. That, in the event of a bombing or other armed attack upon the City of Denver which renders untenable the Denver headquarters of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and in the event that such an attack and the emergency situation created thereby causes the Colorado School of Mines to cease or sharply curtail its educational activities, the Federal Bureau of Investigation be given permission to utilize the facilities and space of Berthoud Hall on the Colorado School of Mines campus in Golden, Colorado.
- 2. That, upon the cessation of such emergency conditions, Berthoud Hall be returned to the use of the Colorado School of Mines in at least as good condition as when its facilities and space were loaned to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
- 3. That, in the event of the above-mentioned emergency, the officials of the Colorado School of Mines cooperate with the Federal Bureau of Investigation in all ways possible to assist in achieving the security of the United States of America.

Golden, Colorado May 14, 1952

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines was called on May 14, 1952, at noon at the University Club, Denver, Colorado.

Present: Messrs. Thomas, Harrison, Parker, Bowen, and Stockmar.

Also present at the meeting, at the invitation of the Board, were Dean M. I. Signer; Dean William V. Burger; Mr. G. Duncan Wimpress; Professor James O. Ball, Department of Petroleum Refining; Mr. Fritz S. Brennecke, Athletics Department; Mr. William A. Colburn, Department of Physics; Professor George W. Johnson, English Department; Mr. W. Alan Stewart, Department of Geology; and Dr. Leon S. Ward, Chemistry Department.

President Vanderwilt attended the meeting.

Mr. Thomas, President of the Board, presided.

The discussions were initiated by Mr. Thomas who explained that the meeting was called for the purpose of reviewing, with a representative group of the faculty, the faculty resolution relative to abolishing Senior Day which had been presented to the Board of Trustees at its regular meeting on May 9, 1952. Mr. Thomas stated that the Board unanimously agreed, and it was so recorded in the minutes of the Board meeting of May 9, 1952, that Senior Day as it stood should be abolished but that final action should be deferred until further consideration was given on the most effective procedure for abolishing Senior Day. Alternatives other than complete abolishment were fully discussed. Each member of the Board and faculty attending expressed his views. There was unanimous agreement that the only effective course was the complete abolishment of Senior Day.

Mr. Thomas then assembled the members of the Board, and after reviewing the information and discussion of the faculty group, on motion duly seconded and unanimously passed, approved and adopted the resolution abolishing Senior Day as recorded in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Trustees on May 9, 1952.

It was further agreed that a full account should be prepared for publication in The Oredigger on May 20, 1952 to fully inform all students of the abolishment of Senior Day and to give the reasons for its abolishment by action of the faculty, the Board of Trustees, and the administration.

The meeting adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

Golden, Colorado June 15, 1952

The Board of Trustees met in special session on June 15, 1952, at noon, at the University Club, Denver, Colorado.

Present: Messrs. Parker, Stockmar, and Harrison.

Absent: Mesers. Thomas and Bowen.

Mr. Steinhauer attended the meeting. President Vanderwilt was present.

The purpose of the meeting was to afford an opportunity for final review of the school budget for 1952-53, and to give further consideration to the proposed preparation of a color motion picture film to show the activities and interests of the Colorado School of Mines.

Mr. Steinhauer presented copies of the recommended budget for 1952-53 and reviewed the several items in comparison with like items contained in the 1951-52 appropriation. After a discussion of the information presented, it was moved by Dr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Harrison, and unanimously passed that the budget be accepted and approved as recommended.

President Vanderwilt next reviewed for the benefit of Mr. Stockmar and Mr. Marrison the discussion held at the June 6 meeting which they had been unable to attend. Dr. Parker stated that although similar films had been prepared by other schools and he felt that a color film was an excellent idea, none the less, the estimated cost was high and it was desirable, he felt, that a more careful study should be made of the anticipated benefits before final decision was made. It was unanimously agreed that a full meeting of the Board was desirable for further discussions of this problem, and therefore final decision should not be made during this special meeting. Mr. Stockmar and Mr. Harvison expressed interest in arranging an occasion for them to see a color film prepared by neighboring institutions since they had not had an opportunity to see the files presented on June 6. President Vanderwilt was instructed to arrange for such a showing prior to the next regular meeting of the Board on July 11. It was the opinion of the Board that Mr. Wimpress should be invited to present the advantages and benefits of a color film at the next meeting of the Board in order that a final decision could be made as soon as possible.

The meeting adjourned at 2:00 P.M.

The minutes of the regular meeting of May 9, 1952 were reviewed and approved.

Mr. Thomas recommended for the consideration of the Board the preparation of a resolution or other fitting acknowledgment of Mr. A. Hartwell Bradford's generous contributions to the school in recent years. Thereupon the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

MHERBAS Mr. A. H. Bradford (E.M., 1909), Los Angeles, California, has, as in each of the past four years, once again expressed his loyalty and devotion to the Colorado School of Mines with a generous cash gift to the school, and

WHEREAS he has, through the years, been continuously active in his support of the school and its Alumni Association,

HE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Coloredo School of Mines that its sincere gratitude and appreciation be expressed to Mr. Bradford for his thoughtfulness and generosity.

Mr. Thomas suggested that President Vanderwilt also provide Mr. Bradford with full information concerning the purposes and objectives of the "Endomment Fund of the Colorado School of Mines Alumni Association" and the "Colorado School of Mines Foundation, Inc.," and also recommend for Mr. Bradford's consideration the transfer of the Bradford Fund to the account of the Colorado School of Mines Foundation, Inc., subject to any terms and conditions which Mr. Bradford might care to specify.

W. L. Mattsom in which a cordial invitation had been extended to the Board of Trustees of the school to review the progress and plans of the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation. Mr. Thomas stated that he felt that although the Research Foundation was an independent organization, it was so closely related to the school that he personally was interested in accepting Mr. Mattson's invitation. Dr. Parker and Mr. Bowen agreed that this would be an excellent thing to do, and that they would be interested in visiting the Experimental Plant of the Research Foundation at any time, even though they were familiar with progress because of the fact that they were members of the Board of Trustees of the "Research Foundation". It was mutually agreed that a visit to the Research Foundation would be planned for one of the next meetings of the Board of Trustees, either in July or August whichever day might seem more convenient. President Vanderwilt was instructed to so advise Mr. Mattson.

President Vanderwilt presented the new letter agreement dated July 1, 1952 between the Military Department, State of Colorado, for benefit of the Colorado National Guard, and the Colorado School of Mines, for use of a part of the Armory Building in Golden by the Military Department. This letter agreement included no change over the agreement entered into with the Colorado National Guard for the preceding year and therefore President Vanderwilt stated that he recommended its acceptance. On motion by Br. Parker, and seconded by Mr. Bowen, it was unanimously passed that Mr. Thomas as President of the Board of Trustees and Mr. Bowen as Secretary of the Board to authorized to sign seven copies of said agreement.

President Vanderwilt read a letter dated June 3, 1952 addressed to the "Board of Directors" of the Colorado School of Mines by Samuel M. Harris of 1530 Hople Street in Golden offering his home for sale to the Colorado School of Mines for the sum of \$15,000. That amount, President Vanderwilt stated, was the top appraisal value placed on the property by Mr. John C. Bart of Golden in a letter of April 24, 1952 addressed to Mr. Gurnett Steinhauer. In the appraisal by Mr. Burt, attention was called to the fact that the residence was equite old and in a poor state of repair and will require considerable expense to bring it to a serviceable condition." Comparing the physical facilities and condition of the Harris house with the two properties purchased by the school within the past two years, it was the unanimous opinion of the Board that the purchase price of \$15,000 named by Mr. Harris was excessive. After considerable discussion, President Vanderwilt was authorized to make an offer of \$12,000 to Mr. Marris for the sale of his property, it being understood that the offer would be subject to the appraisal of the Colorado State Planning Commission.

Because of the depletion of the cash balance of student loan funds, President Vanderwilt explained that it had been necessary to cash Series F bonds held in the student loan fund accounts. The bonds cashed had a maturity value of \$4,000 and were in the name of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines. On recommendation of Mr. John Q. Adams, President of the First National Bank of Golden, the bonds had been signed by President Vanderwilt and Mr. Steinhauer with the understanding that authorization of these signatures would be provided at an early date in the form of a resolution by the Board of Trustees. President Vanderwilt continued that the funds provided by the cashing of these bonds would be adequate for the need of student loans, at least until fall. It was felt that when additional funds were required, it would be desirable to give consideration to transfer or sale of these Series F bonds to the Guggenheim Foundation in order to take advantage of the relatively high rate of interest which is lost when such bonds are cashed. Mr. Thomas commented, and it was unanimously agreed, that in the event additional cash funds were required for student loans, consideration be given to transfer of the Series F bonds rather than turning them in for cash.

On motion of Dr. Parker and seconded by Mr. Bowen, it was unanimously passed that Mr. John W Vanderwilt and Mr. Gurnett Steinhauer be authorized to sign four bonds for payment to the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines, and the following recolution was passed:

AREOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines that Mr. John W Vander-wilt, Fresident, and Mr. Gurnett Steinhauer, Treasurer, be authorized to sign and collect for the following bonds purchased with funds of the John Logan Yetes Loan Fund: No. M 12h5502 F, \$1,000.00; No. M 730823 F, \$1,000.00; and No. M 73082h F, \$1,000.00

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting at this time to review the preliminary budget for the academic year 1952-53. Mr. Steinhauer explained that presentation of the final budget approved by the Board of Trustees was required by Mr. James Moonan at the state

house not later than June 16. It was recommended that a luncheon meeting be arranged at the University Club at noon on June 16 to review the final budget, at which time final approval of the budget could be made by the Board. Hr. Thomas stated that this would be satisfactory with him, but he felt that it would be desirable, if possible in the future, to submit the preliminary budget and the final budget so as to allow a little more time for review. Dr. Parker called attention to the fact that because the budget could not be prepared until close to the end of the fiscal year which corresponded somewhat closely to the deadline set by the Controller's Office, it was very difficult to have the budget in such a form that adequate review by the Ecard of Trustees was possible. Dr. Parker agreed with Mr. Thomas that more time was desirable for review and that every effort should be made in the future to permit such a review because he felt it was desirable that the Board of Trustees become as familiar as possible with the operating budget of the School of Mines.

Mr. Steinhauer called attention to the need for special consideration of two items in the preliminary budget: one, an item of \$h0,000 for the construction of a warehouse or service building; two, an item of \$13,000 for preparation of a color film to show the activities and facilities of the school. These two items had been questioned by the budget committee and reviewed with President Vanierwilt. In the discussion that followed, it was decided by the Board that the item of \$h0,000 for a warehouse should be charged to the Mill Levy Building Fund and not to the operating budget of the school. Further consideration of the construction of such a warehouse was left for a later date.

During the discussion that followed concerning the desirability of preparing a color film at the cost of \$13,000, Mr. G. Duncan Wimpress entered the meeting to present his views. He explained that as a basis for consideration of a similar film for the Colorado School of Mines an arrangement had been made with Mr. Tom Bartre of Denver, with whom he had discussed the preparation of such a film, to show a color film prepared for Golorado Agricultural and Mechanical College, and also a film prepared by the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company. The Board of Trustees unanimously agreed that the item of \$13,000 for a color film should be included in the budget for 1952-53 as a tentative item and that final decision would have to wait until a further study could be made of the estimated advantages that would be derived from such an expenditure. Thereupon the Board of Trustees made its way to Berthoud Hall to view the color film of Colorado A & M and also the Colorado Fuel and Iron film arranged by Mr. Barbre.

The Ecard, Mr. Steinhauer, Mr. Wispress, Mr. Barbre and his assistant, Mr. Ainsley Davis, then adjourned to the Holland House for lunch. During lunch the merits of the two films and the possible advantages to the school of a color film were discussed by Mr. Barbre who also answered numerous questions presented by the members of the Board.

Following lunch Mr. Bowen asked to be excused because of an appointment in Coloredo Springs and left the meeting.

Mr. Thomas, Dr. Parker, Mr. Steinhauer, Mr. Wimpress, and President Vanderwilt reconvened in the President's Office and continued a discussion of the color film. It was mutually agreed that Mr. Stock-mar and Mr. Harrison should be fully informed before a decision could

be reached. Mr. Wimpress recommended that an early decision be made because if it was decided to prepare a motion picture film, it would be desirable to take advantage of the current summer session to obtain pictures of Wild Horse Park, the experimental mine, and other activities that take place during the summer session.

Mr. Wimpress left the meeting at this time.

Mr. Steinhauer then briefly reviewed the monthly statements not covered earlier. The statements reviewed were Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements as of May 31, 1952; the Balance Sheet for May 31, 1952; the Mill Levy Building Fund as of May 31, 1952; the Special Building Fund as of May 31, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense, Dining Hall, April 26 through May 26, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense, Canteen, May, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense, On teen and Dining Hall, May, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector Park, May, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector Park, May, 1952; the Statement of Income and Expense, Veterans Housing, May, 1952; the Trial Balance, May 31, 1952, 1950-51 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc.; the Trial Balance, May 31, 1952, 1951-52 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc.

Mr. Stainhauer then left the moeting.

In the absence of a quorum, no further official action was taken. At the request of Mr. Thomas a brief review was made of the problem discussed briefly by the Board on May 9, 1952 pertaining to refinancing which had been raised by an opinion of the Attorney General. This opinion had prohibited the plans for refinancing followed for many years by other state institutions. President Vanderwilt stated that in company with Mr. Steinbauer he had had a conference on June 5 with Mr. Moonan who had stated, in his opinion, the best solution would be a clarification of the existing law by legislative action during the next General Assembly. President Vanderwilt stated that Mr. Noonan had suggested that this matter be presented and reviewed at the next meeting of the Presidents' group. This would permit all concerned to decide on the proper course of action in order that a proper bill may be prepared for presentation this coming year. It had been agreed that the Covernor, the Controller, the Attorney General, the Planning Commission, and representatives from each of the seven institutions of higher education should participate in the program. President Vanderwilt had assured Mr. Noonan that the suggestion was excellent, and the matter would be presented at the next Presidents' meeting which would be early in July. Mr. Thomas stated that he thought everyone was agreed that a clarification of the law by the legislature was desirable and that since Mr. Noonan obviously felt the same way, he thought that there would be no great difficulty in having such a law passed. He suggested that President Vanderwilt obtain such additional information as time would permit and review the entire problem at the meeting of the Board of Trustees in July.

The meeting adjourned at 2:30, P.M.
