The minutes of the regular session of September 12, 1952 were reviewed.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the request of Coach Brennecke for permission to schedule a freshmen football game with a penitentiary team at Canon City. The reasons given by Coach Brennecke for considering this possibility were that it had not been possible to schedule any games for the freshmen team this fall and in the absence of a game, the boys were likely to lose interest and drop out for the season; also, he had understood that Colorado College has played the penitentiary team with its freshmen or "B" squad each year and the Colorado College Director of Athletics reports the games were well conducted and cleanly played. As an added inducement the penitentiary officials have offered to provide meals for the visiting team and take the team on a conducted tour of the penitentiary which Brennecke thinks might be a good educational experience. In discussing such a game with Dean Signer, Dean Burger, and others of the staff, President Vanderwilt continued, the first reaction had not been favorable, but since Coach Brennecke's recommendation was based on the experience of Colorado College a review by the Board seemed desirable. In the discussion that followed, the members of the Board expressed a similar unfavorable reaction, but recommended that Coach Brennecke be instructed to investigate the record experienced by Colorado College further and if he could find no objections to such a game, the Board of Trustees would be willing to rely on his and the President's judgment as to whether it would be desirable to schedule a game between the "Mines" freshmen football team and the penitentiary team at Canon City.

President Vanderwilt reviewed a letter received from President Ross of Coloredo State College of Education concerning vandalism on the campus of State College of Education believed to have been done by students of the Colorado School of Mines on the day of the football game, September 26, 1952.

An agreement by the Colorado School of Mines permitting the construction of an electric power line by Colorado Central Power Company across certain lands of the Colorado School of Mines was reviewed and discussed. President Vanderwilt stated that this contract had been reviewed by Mr. Stockmar who felt that the interests of the school were well protected, and therefore it was ready for signature by the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees. Mr. Thomas signed the original and four copies.

President Vanderwilt read a letter from Mr. K. W. Nickerson, Jr. and reviewed a request received by telephone from Mr. Robert McMillan concerning the possibility of granting the title "Professor Emeritus" to deserving members of the faculty who would be retiring under the mandatory retirement policy of the school. Dr. Parker suggested that in his opinion the granting of the title "Professor Emeritus" was worthy of further study and he also felt it was desirable that consideration be given to providing office space and research facilities to retiring heads of departments for use in the interest and benefit of the school. It was mutually agreed that the subject should be reviewed and discussed at a later meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting at this time and presented the monthly statements as follows: Balance Sheet, September 30, 1952; Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements as of September 30, 1952; Mill Levy Building Fund, as of

September 30, 1952; Special Building Fund as of September 30, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Dining Hall, August 25 through September 25, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Canteen, September, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Canteen and Dining Hall, September, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Kines Park, September, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector Park, September, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Veterans Housing, September, 1952; Trial Balance, September 30, 1952; 1951-52 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Rines, Inc.; Trial Balance, September 30, 1952, 1952-53 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Rines, Inc.

The 1953-Sh budget for the school was next reviewed by Mr. Steinhauer which he explained incorporated the changes recommended at the October meeting. Mesors. Thomas and Parker expressed the view that although formal approval could not be granted in the absence of a quorum, it was recommended that the budget be submitted to the Controller as the official budget.

A summary of loans from student loan funds for the period February 1, 1952 to October 1, 1952 was presented by Mr. Steinhauer and reviewed.

The members of the Board, President Vanderwilt, and Mr. Steinhauer adjourned for lunch at 12:30.

After lunch, Dr. Parker asked to be excused and did not return to the meeting.

President Vandervilt discussed the financial situation of Mines Park and reviewed the plans for financial and construction of a dormitory. Mr. Themas recommended that a luncheon meeting be arranged in Denver with members of the Deard of Trustees and Mr. Robert K. Fuller, Architect, in order to discuss with him whether he would be interested and able, in view of the time that might be available, to undertake the added responsibility of drawing plans and specifications for a dormitory.

The meeting adjourned at 3:30 p.m.

The minutes of the meeting held September 12, 1952 were read and approved as read.

The Board unanimously approved the reading and auditing of the bills by Mesers. Thomas and Parker as recorded in the memorandum of the meeting on October 10, 1952.

By formal action the Board approved the change of effective date from January 1, 1953 to September 17, 1952 in the resolution for renewal of the Colorado School of Mines Basic Permit TF COLO-26 passed at the September 12, 1952 meeting. This change was made at the request of the Department of Internal Revenue.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the exchange of letters he had had with Mr. Mark U. Watrous, Chief Highway Engineer, concerning the right-of-way centract for U. S. Highway No. 6. Mr. Thomas pointed out that the information provided by Mr. Natrous merely confirmed the fact that the Highway Department has not lived up to the centract, and that the information provided did not include a definite statement from the Attorney General's office as to what could or should be done under the circumstances. Mr. Stockmar agreed to get in touch with the Attorney General's office in order to get first hand such information as may be available and report his findings to the Board at a later meeting.

The recommendation made by the Chairman of the Graduate Committee dated October 9, 1952 was read as follows:

"The Committee believes that the Dean's first responsibility should be to the Graduate School but that, so far as his graduate administrative duties permit, he should be available to teach either graduate or undergraduate courses. The Committee recommends that in the event Professor Clark B. Carpenter is offered and accepts the position of Dean of the Graduate School, he should be permitted, if he wishes, to continue as Read of the Department of Metallurgy. However, the Committee believes that subsequent Graduate Deans should not be Reads of any undergraduate department."

The general qualifications of Dean of the Graduate School were discussed. President Vanderwilt stated that he was most favorably impressed with the manner in which Professor Carpenter, who would retire at the end of this year under the retirement policy, had served as Chairman of the Graduate Committee for many years. It was suggested and mutually agreed that consideration be given to a plan for naming Professor Carpenter as Dean of the Graduate School as soon as satisfactory arrangements can be made and at the same time select a successor to work with him in formulating current and long range plans for a graduate program. It was felt that a transition of the work under the chairmanship of a Graduate Committee to a Dean of the Graduate School could be accomplished with maximum efficiency.

Mr. Thomas reviewed for the benefit of the Board the understandings which had been arrived at through discussions with Mr. Robert K. Fuller, architect, concerning work necessary for a dermitory housing approximately 80 men. To fine ce such a dermitory, it would be necessary to obtain a loan under the Housing Act of 1950. Mr. Steinhauer had reported that about six to eight months are required

for processing a loan and that preliminary plans by an architect are necessary for estimating cost. To have the doraitory ready for occupancy by June 1, 1954 the completed application for a government loan should be filed by January 1, 1953 and construction should begin not later than October 1, 1953. In the discussions with Mr. Fuller, Mr. Fuller had agreed to have preliminary plans ready by January 1, 1953 and the final plans and specifications ready by September 1, 1953. A standard contract was to be entered into with Fuller, Fuller & Fuller, Architects, with a base rate of 6% for architectual services, plus an additional him for any portions of the work let under separate contracts. In the event it was not possible to proceed with construction, the Board would be obligated to the architect for work done. By unanimous agreement, the Board approved the plan to enter into a contract with Fuller, Fuller & Fuller for construction of a dormitory unit to house approximately 80 men.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting to review the following monthly statements: Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of October 31, 1952, Balance Sheet, October 31, 1952; Mill
Levy Building Fund, as of October 31, 1952; Special Building Fund, as
of October 31, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Dining Hall,
September 25 through October 24, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense,
Canteen, October, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Canteen and
Dining Hall, October, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Mines
Fark, October, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector
Park, October, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Veterans
Housing, October, 1952; Trial Balance, October 30, 1952, 1951-52
Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School
of Mines, Incorporated; and Trial Balance, October 31, 1952, 1952-53
Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School
of Mines, Incorporated.

The receipt of \$783,085.05 under the Mineral Leasing Act for the fiscal year 1951-52 was reported. It was moved by Dr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Stockmar, and unanimously passed that the following resolution be adopted:

RESOLVED, That the State Controller be requested to transfer and the Governor be requested to approve the transfer from the Mineral Leasing Act Funds of the Colorado School of Mines the amount of \$583,085.05 (which is the excess received from the Mineral Leasing Act during the fiscal period over the amount of \$200,000.00 budgeted for the current fiscal period for the maintenance and operation of the Petroleum Engineering Department,) to the Special Building Fund, Account No. 3034, of the School of Mines, there to be earmarked for the provision of physical facilities for instruction in Petroleum Engineering, the investigation of problems connected with the oil industry, or for such other purposes as the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines may determine.

The income and costs pertaining to Mines Park were reviewed, together with the need for additional income to meet mounting operating costs. Mr. Thomas stated that this problem had been discussed with him at the meeting on September 12, 1952, and he was convinced that it would not be possible to meet expenses

without an increase in rent. It was moved by Mr. Stockmar, seconded by Dr. Parker, and unanimously passed that an increase of approximately 15% be made, effective January 1, 1953, and that notices be sent to the occupants of Mines Park immediately. The present rates and the rates effective January 1, 1953 were read into the minutes as follows:

The members of the Board then recessed for lunch at the School Dining Hall, accompanied by Mr. Steinhauer, Mr. Wimpress, and President Vanderwilt. Following lunch, the Board reconvened in the President's Office. Mr. Steinhauer did not re-enter the meeting.

Mr. Wimpress entered the meeting and read and reviewed the Senier Day letter which had been revised to include the comments and suggestions received from the Board of Trustees at earlier meetings. The letter was approved by the Board as read and it was unanimously agreed that it should be sent to parents of students soon using registered mail for parents of seniors and regular mail for other parents.

The final script for the color movie being prepared by Mr. Thos. J. Barbre was read and reviewed by the Board. The Board expressed approval and felt that Mr. Barbre was to be complimented on his work. Mr. Thomas stated that he thought it would be well if each member of the Board was provided with a copy of the script after final revision had been made.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the plans for a College-Community Council being set up to discuss various matters of mutual interest to the Colorado School of Mines and the City of Golden. The proposed College-Community Council would include one member each from the Chamber of Commerce, Jr. Chamber of Commerce, Colden City Council, Kiwanis Club, Lions Club, P.T.A. In addition there would be four members-at-large, one of whom would be the Mayor of the City of Golden, and four representatives from the Colorado School of Mines. Much interest has been shown in the proposed College-Community Council. and Mayor Barnhardt recommended strongly that the representatives from the school include a member of the Board of Trustees. Mr. Thomas stated that he thought such a College-Community Council was a good idea and that he saw no objection to having a member of the Board of Trustees included in its membership; however, he thought it would not be possible or desirable for the representative to express the official thinking of the Board of Trustees. Mr. Stockmar stated that he felt the advantages of a representative from the Board of Trustees on such a Council would out-weigh possible disadvantages. It was sutually agreed that the local representative on the proposed College-Community Council should be Dr. Parker and he was unanimously elected.

Consideration was given to the problem pertaining to approval of non-accredited courses at the Colorado School of Mines for Korean veterans attending the school under Public Law 550, 82nd

Congress. Unless non-accredited courses are approved by a state constitute for veteran education and training, Korean veterans may not receive benefits set up under the law. At the Colorado School of Mines the hon-accredited courses include graduate work and the undergraduate courses in the Department of Geophysical Engineering. The reason these courses are not accredited arises from the fact that the E.C.P.D., Engineering Council for Professional Development, which is the national accrediting agency for engineering colleges, has not undertaken the accrediting of these fields in my college of engineering. Public Law 550, 82nd Congress, requires:

"The institution has and saintains a policy for the refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees, and other charges in the event the veteran fails to enter the course or withdraws or is discontinued therefrom at any time prior to completion and such policy must provide that the amount charged to the veteran for tuition, fees, and other charges for a portion of the course shall not exceed the approximate pro-rata portion of the total charges for tuition, fees, and other charges that the length of the completed portion of the course bears to its total length."

In order to comply with this requirement of Public Law 550, it was moved by Dr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Stockmar, and unanimously carried that the following resolution be passed:

RESOLVED, That for those veterans enrolled in non-accredited curricula under Public Law 550, 62nd Congress (Korean Veterans Bill) a refund policy conforming to Item 13, Paragraph C, Section 25h, of the above bill shall become effective beginning with the 1952-53 school year.

Mr. Stockmar moved, Dr. Parker seconded, and it was unanimously passed that the refund policy apply only to the veteran students under Public Law No. 550 errolled in non-accredited courses, that the pro-rata refund be calculated on a weekly basis, that a fraction of a week be considered a full week, and that the policy would automatically be cancelled as soon as the non-accredited courses in question become accredited.

A discussion followed concerning the problem of accrediting courses by the E.C.P.D. or the North Central Association. It was hoped, President Vanderwilt stated, that the problem raised by the Public Law 550 would compel the E.C.P.D. to take definite action with respect to accrediting Geophysical Engineering and the graduate curricula. Inquiries were also being made of the North Central Association as to the requirements and procedures for accrediting, and the possible advantages of being accredited in both the E.C.P.D. and H.C.A. would be considered.

President Vanderwilt read to the Board of Trustees a memorandum dated November 13, 1952 from Dean Signer on the subject of holidays during the academic year at "Mines." It was brought out that only the Colorado School of Mines recognizes as holidays such days as Columbus, Armistice, election day, Lincoln's and Washington's birthdays. Meet of the institutions in Golorado recognize such days as Master, Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Labor Day, in addition to the regular holiday periods at Thanksgiving and Christmas. The

result of these special holidays at the Colorado School of Nines is in effect a shorter sesseter sesson as compared with other institutions. Moreover, a number of the faculty members report that the extra holidays interfere with class schedules. Although final action was not expected of the Board at this time, President Vanderwilt continued, it would be helpful to have an expression as to the general reaction of the Board concerning this problem. It was brought out by Dr. Parker that certain holidays were established by law for Civil Service employees which tend to dictate or encourage the establishment of such holidays on campus. Mr. Thomas recommended that further consideration be given to this problem from the point of view of scholastic program and class schedule, and if it seemed desirable to eliminate some or all of the special holidays, then steps should be taken to make such arrangements as might be necessary to provide employees to keep school open for class instruction on these days.

Mr. Thomas raised the question as to the status of the letter to be sent to Mr. Dunbar, Attorney General, concerning approval of travel expenses for the athletic program at the school. He recommended that consideration be given to obtain approval to use state questions funds for the payment of all on-campus costs pertaining to the athletic consideration program. This would leave only travel and guarantees to be paid for by gate receipts and student fees Mr. Stockmar stated that he had been studying the proposed letter to Mr. Dunbar, the Attorney General, and wished to make a further check as to the law concerning the proposal contined by Mr. Thomas.

The use of school equipment was briefly discussed. President Vanderwilt stated that discussions were being held with members of the faculty in an attempt to work out a policy that would apply to all situations. Since school equipment was purchased for educational use, it was felt that any acceptable policy must take into account whether a proposed use was in the interest of the educational objective of the school. Because of the wide diversity of opinion received from the faculty, President Vanderwilt stated that he felt it was very desirable that a formal policy be established concerning the use of all school facilities. It was generally agreed that a formal policy should be established, but that it would be desirable to state such a policy in as broad terms as possible.

Mesors. Robert M. and Kenneth Fuller entered the meeting to review the plans for the Library. They explained that the preliminary plans had been left with Mr. Dickison, the Librarian, and with President Vanderwilt about three weeks ago. Changes that were requested were of a relatively minor nature. The question raised by President Vanderwilt concerning the location of the Library with respect to lith Street had been restudied and as a result the position of the building had been relocated a short distance closer to the sidewalk on lith Street. Mr. Thomas inquired of Mr. Fuller if he himself was satisfied with the plans and whether he felt it incorporated the views and needs he had obtained from Mr. Dickison, the Librarian, and other members of the school staff. Mr. Fuller replied in the affirmative. Thereupon it was moved by Dr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Stockmar, and unanimously passed that the preliminary plans presented by the firm of Faller, Fuller & Fuller be approved, and that instructions be given to the architect to proceed with the preparation of detailed plans and specifications.

The Board considered a letter addressed to it from the officers of the Senior Class requesting that certain activities associated with Senior Day be allowed. After some discussion, the

consensus of opinion was that any activity or demonstration resembling Senior Day would be in violation of the proclamation published in the Oredigger of May 20, 1952 which was signed by Mr. Thomas, President of the Board of Trustees, and President Vanderwilt and which abolished Senior Day unequivocally. President Vanderwilt was instructed to inform the officers of the Senior Class as to the position of the Board.

The meeting adjourned at h: 30 P.M.

The minutes of the meeting held November 14, 1952 were read and the second paragraph, Page 16, was corrected to read:

Mr. Thomas raised the question as to the status of the letter to be sent to Mr. Dunbar, Attorney General, concerning approval of travel expenses for the athletic program at the school. He recommended that consideration be given to obtaining approval of the use of state funds for payment of all on-campus costs pertaining to the athletic program. This would leave only travel and guarantees to be paid for by gate receipts and student fees, and consideration should be given to the possibility of eliminating guarantees both ways. Mr. Stockmar stated that he had been studying the proposed letter to Mr. Dunbar, the Attorney General, and wished to make a further check as to the law concerning the proposal outlined by Mr. Thomas.

The minutes of the November 14 meeting were then approved as corrected.

Mr. Stockmar reviewed his conversations with Mr. John Evans of the Attorney General's effice concerning possible plans for a solution of the problem arising from the State Highway Department's inability to meet the terms of its right-of-way contract. It was mutually agreed that the school could well afford to pay a reasonable amount to obtain title to the property involved. Mr. Stockmar was authorized to continue his conferences with the Attorney General's office and the Highway Department and keep the Board informed.

President Vanderwilt reported that he had found Professor Clark B. Carpenter very much interested and willing to accept the deanship of the Graduate School in accordance with the plan outlined in the minutes of the November 14 meeting. After a brief discussion, President Vanderwilt was authorized to proceed with the appointment of the Dean of the Graduate School in accordance with the plan.

President Vanderwilt reported that the contract with Fuller, Fuller, & Fuller for architectural services in connection with the doraitory had been signed by Mr. Thomas as Fresident and Mr. Stockmar as Assistant Secretary, but that preliminary plans for the doraitory were not far enough along for review and approval.

A copy of the final script for the proposed movie being filmed by Mr. Barbre was distributed to each member of the Board.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting and reviewed the following statements. Colorado School of Mines Pinancial Statement for the period July 1, 1951 to June 30, 1952; Balance Sheet, November 30, 1952; Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements, as of November 30, 1952; Mill Levy Building Fund, as of November 30, 1952; Special Building Fund, as of November 30, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Dining Hall, October 2h through November 26, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Canteen and Dining Hall, November, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Mines Park, November, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector Park, November, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector Park, November, 1952; Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector Park, November, 1952; and 1952-53 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Incorporated.

Mr. Steinhauer stated that a bill from Fuller, Fuller, & Fuller for architectural services in connection with the library had been charged to the Special Building Fund.

Mr. Matteon joined the Board and the Board recessed for lunch in the School Dining Hall, accompanied by Mr. Matteon and Mr. Steinhauer.

Following lunch the group visited the Research Foundation, escorted by Mr. Mattson.

At 2:00 P.M. the Board, Mr. Steinhauer, and President Vanderwilt reconvened in the President's Office.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the request dated Docember 5, 1952 by Kenneth R. Femsick for the Doard of Trustees of the Pleasant View Metropolitan District for a right-of-way across school property to construct a water supply main, southeast from the reservoir of the City of Golden. Mr. Steinhauer stated that the proposed right-of-way was in the vicinity of existing water lines which served the Golden Cemetery, Pleasant View School, and Camp George West. It was recommended by the Board that Mr. Steinhauer proceed to try to work out a plan that would be in conformity with existing right-of-ways, it being understood that such a plan should include preferred rights to the Colorado School of Nines and be subject to approval by the Attorney General.

Mr. Steinhauer reported that a letter had been written to the Attorney General's office concerning the payment of athletic expenses from the general fund, but as yet no reply had been received.

Mr. Steinhauer then left the meeting.

Wanderwilt by the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation, Inc. as to the reaction of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines to the loan of Mr. Wimpress full time to the Research Foundation to raise funds for a much needed analytical wing. Time required to raise the funds was estimated at from six months to a year. The possible disadvantages to the school program because of such a loan as against the possible advantages of the experience to be gained by a drive for funds for the Research Foundation were considered. It was generally agreed that the over-all disadvantages to the school were such that some other plan should be considered by the Research Foundation.

In the discussion that followed the suggestion was made that possibly a part of the Special Building Fund could be used to provide facilities for investigations pertaining to petroleum by the Research Foundation. Mr. Mattson was invited to join the meeting and give his views on this proposal. Mr. Mattson stated that he felt the proposal to use school funds for petroleum research had considerable merit, and that he would be glad to discuss this proposal with a spokesman for a number of oil companies who had discussed with him the possibility of a project at the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation. The Board accepted Mr. Mattson's recommendations and authorized him to make a trip to Los Angeles and contact the representatives to whom he referred.

President Vanderwilt reported having received a letter addressed to the Board of Trustees by Professor M. A. Ireland, University of Kansas, recommending that an honorary degree be conferred on Mr. Ronald M. DeFord, an alumnum of the school. Professor Ireland had been advised that it had been the policy of the Board of Trustees not to confer honorary degrees on alumni of the school. This letter and reply were called to the attention of the Board, Fresident Vanderwilt continued, because the policy regarding granting honorary degrees is not recorded in the minutes

and therefore confirmation by the Board was thought desirable. In the discussion that followed, it was brought out that Distinguished Achievement Hedals were established for alumni to take the place of honorary degrees and that for many years an honorary degree had been awarded on the occasion of a Commencement address by an alumnus; but otherwise it had been the understood policy not to give honorary degrees to alumni of the school. It was unanimously agreed that this policy should be continued.

President Vanderwilt presented a bond to the United States of America in the amount of \$32,000 for Safekeeping of Public Animals, Arms, Ammunition, Supplies, Uniforms, Equipment, and Means of Transportation issued to Educational Institutions under Section 47, Maticnal Defense Act of June 3, 1916, as amended by Act of June 4, 1920. After consideration of this bond, the following resolution was moved by Mr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Stockmar, and unanimously carried:

"RESOLVED, That Lester C. Thomas, President of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines, be and is hereby authorised to execute on behalf of the Colorado School of Mines a bond to the United States of America in the amount of \$32,000 for safekeeping of public animals, arms, ammunition, supplies, uniforms, equipment, and means of transportation issued to educational institutions under Section 17, National Defense Act of June 3, 1716, as amended by Act of June 4, 1920; and that Max W. Bowen, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines, be and is hereby authorized to attest said execution."

The question of conferring emeritus status to Professor Clark B. Carpenter and Dr. F. M. Van Tuyl upon their retirement from the school at the end of the present scholastic year was discussed. President Vanderwilt stated that he had been advised by representatives of the Colorado School of Rines Alumni Association that plans were being considered for honoring Professor Carpenter and Dr. Van Tuyl, and it would be helpful to them if general plans of the Board of Trustees could be known some time in advance. Hembers of the Board were unanimously in favor of conferring the emeritus status on Professor Carpenter and Dr. Van Tuyl, and President Vanderwilt was authorized to so advise the representatives of the Alumni Association.

The meeting adjourned at 5:30
