

of Income and Expense, April, 1954; Prospector Park, Statement of Income and Expense, April, 1954; Trial Balance, 1953-54 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc., April 30, 1954; and Summary of Budget Receipts for Infirmary from September 10, 1953 to April 30, 1954.

Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the cash balance under "Current Funds" and a discussion followed on the possibility of investing a certain amount of this cash or depositing some in a savings account. Mr. Steinhauer was instructed to prepare a further analysis showing monthly balances and disbursements since July 1, 1953 which analysis would serve as a basis for consideration of policy regarding the cash balance by the Board at the next regular meeting.

The Board recessed for lunch at the Holland House and was joined by Mr. Vernon L. Mattson and Mr. Wilburn F. Anderson of the Research Foundation. President Vanderwilt and Mr. Steinhauer attended the luncheon.

Mr. Mattson distributed to all those present copies of "Analysis of All Funds Utilized by the Experimental Plant and the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation, Inc., 1949-1954" prepared by the CSM Research Foundation for the CSM Board of Trustees meeting. Mr. Mattson reviewed in detail the figures presented in the analysis and recommended that the analysis of funds utilized be considered in the light of the background information covered in the first 8 pages of the analysis, there being no Page 9 because of an error.

President Vanderwilt read the resolution pertaining to the Research Foundation which was under consideration by the Board. The question as to a fair amount of annual rental was discussed. In the discussion, it was emphasized that the Board did not have in mind a rental which would add to the cost of operation of the Research Foundation, but that plant improvements, added equipment, and other benefits would more than cover the rental to be established. It was felt that the table on Page 10 of the analysis presented by Mr. Mattson covering the cost to the Colorado School of Mines of the development of the Experimental Plant and the Research Foundation and the benefits derived might well be the basis for establishing a fair rental figure. The Board requested that Mr. Mattson, with the help of Mr. Steinhauer, prepare an inventory of equipment, plant, plant additions, and plant improvement for the record.

As the discussion was concluded, Mr. Thomas expressed appreciation for the full analysis and the detailed explanation presented by Mr. Mattson of funds utilized by the Experimental Plant and the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation from 1949 to 1954.

The meeting reconvened in the President's Office, Mr. Steinhauer attending.

The proposed resolution regarding the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation, Inc. which was discussed earlier in the meeting and reviewed with Mr. Mattson was again discussed in the light of the analysis and information provided by Mr. Mattson. It was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that the resolution be adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, Section 14 of Chapter 145 of Colorado Statutes Annotated, as amended, adopted in 1927, provides for an annual tax levy on all taxable property in the State of Colorado for the use, benefit, maintenance and support of a mining experiment station at the Colorado School of Mines; and

WHEREAS, following the adoption of the tax levy, the fund derived therefrom each year was barely sufficient, even with other funds supplied from the maintenance and operating budget of the school to staff, maintain and operate the school's experimental plant, to provide facilities for limited research and to provide for the making of assays and analyses as required by law and was not sufficient to provide any surplus for the conducting of substantial experiments in mining problems; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees determined that more effective utilization of the experimental plant could be made by permitting research supported by other than state funds to be carried on with a consequent reduction of the overhead previously carried by the school itself; and

WHEREAS, to resolve the problem and to aid and encourage mining experimentation and research, the Board of Trustees actively promoted the formation of the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation, Inc., a not-for-profit organization, which was formally chartered on January 13, 1949; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees determined to permit the Research Foundation to make a partial use of the facilities and equipment of the school's experimental plant in furtherance of the objects of the Foundation at an appropriate rental; and

WHEREAS, on account of more effective utilization of the experimental plant and the decrease in costs of maintenance and operation made possible by the rental charged the Foundation, a surplus now and hereafter should exist in amount sufficient to permit a substantial reduction in the amount of funds supplied from the maintenance and operating fund of the school and, in addition, to justify an experimental and research program in behalf of the school itself;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation, Inc. be required to pay for its past and present use of the facilities and equipment in the school's experimental plant an annual rental of \$12,000 beginning with the first day of January, 1950. It being understood that the rental established is subject to change at any time, without notice to anyone, in the sole discretion of the Board of Trustees. The rental shall be payable at the option of the Foundation either in money or in an equivalent value of services or equipment for, or maintenance and permanent improvements of, the experimental plant based upon the actual cost of acquisition or construction. The business manager of the school is hereby directed to bring the school's account with the Foundation up to date as of December 31, 1953, and account for past rentals or its

equivalent in equipment or plant improvement at the June, 1954 meeting of the Board.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of the experimental plant in his capacity as an employee of the school, shall on or before August 1, 1954, evolve and submit to the Board for its consideration an experimental and research program to be undertaken by the school at the experimental plant, which program shall be independent of any program currently or hereafter carried on by the Research Foundation for the benefit of any of its patrons or financial supporters.

In accordance with a request presented at the April meeting of the Board, Mr. Steinhauer distributed a tabulation showing gross annual salaries of teaching faculty and nonteaching faculty, yearly from 1946-47 through 1953-54.

Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the revised budget estimate as of May 14, 1954 for the year 1954-55. Mr. Stockmar asked if the estimated budget would permit a school-sponsored research program and from which items would funds have to come if the Board should wish to consider such a program. These funds, Mr. Steinhauer explained, would have to be obtained from the Maintenance and Operation or Capital Outlay items or from the Estimated Balance as of June 30, 1955. It was pointed out that the Maintenance and Operation and Capital Outlay items were materially less, as estimated for 1954-55, than for the current budget.

In anticipation of a sponsored research program by the school, it was agreed that Mr. Mattson should be requested to present proposals for a research program based on a project or projects totaling \$15,000, \$50,000, and \$75,000.

President Vanderwilt reviewed a letter of May 11, 1954 from Mr. Robert K. Fuller on erection of a proposed Unit Operations Laboratory (Pilot Plant) which building was planned and included under the building project for the new petroleum building. In his letter, Mr. Fuller advised that Mr. W. M. Williams, Director of the State Planning Commission, "voiced no objection to the procedure which was outlined for including the Unit Operations Laboratory Building under the original project set-up for the Petroleum Engineering Building and we may assume that the work can be handled under our suggested procedure," and that "since the original contractor and sub-contractors are through with their original work, that competitive bids be taken for the new building and separate contracts awarded therefor."

President Vanderwilt stated that Professor Ball, Dean Signer, and himself were in agreement that the Unit Operations Laboratory Building should be constructed as originally planned and construction during the coming summer was recommended. Thereupon the Board authorized President Vanderwilt to instruct Fuller, Fuller & Fuller to proceed in accordance with the contract covering the construction of the Petroleum Building and Pilot Plant.

Change Order No. 1, General Contract, Petroleum Building, Colorado School of Mines, Golden, Colorado, was presented for approval. This Change Order was for work completed by the

P. J. Kirchhof Construction Company in total amount of \$6,881.15. It was certified as true and correct by Robert K. Fuller, Architect, under date of April 30, 1954. On motion duly seconded and unanimously passed, the Change Order was approved and the signatures of Lester C. Thomas as President of the Board and Ted P. Stockmar and Ted. P. Stockmar as Assistant Secretary of the Board of Trustees were authorized.

Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the negotiations pertaining to the proposed construction of 8 housing units at Mines Park. He listed the following estimates of cost:

The cost estimates were discussed and reviewed. In connection with the estimated cost of installation of a gas line to the project, Mr. Thomas offered to get in touch with Mr. John E. Loiseau, President of the Public Service Company in Denver, and attempt to obtain information as to cost of installation of gas lines by the company.

It was mutually agreed that it would be desirable to issue bonds to protect the Guggenheim Fund and that an experienced bond attorney be employed to take care of the necessary details. Mr. Steinhauer was authorized to get in touch with Mr. Myles Tallmadge to work out an arrangement for his services.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, the Colorado School of Mines has existing faculty housing units in its Mines Park project and it has been determined that eight additional units are necessary to adequately house the faculty of the school; and

WHEREAS, the Trustees of the bequest made in the will of Simon Guggenheim for the use and benefit of the Colorado School of Mines have agreed to advance to the Colorado School of Mines up to \$123,550.40 toward the construction of such additional housing units; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the school has agreed with the Trustees of the bequest under the Guggenheim will to repay so much of said \$123,550.40 as is advanced for housing purposes, with interest, out of the net revenues of the entire Mines Park project, subject to outstanding indebtedness thereon;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby resolved by the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines that such advance of up to \$123,550.00 shall be held and used by them only for the construction of such additional housing in trust, however, for the Trustees of said Guggenheim fund, and further resolve that the amount so advanced shall be repaid to the Trustees of the Guggenheim fund, together with interest at the rate of four per cent (4%) per annum on the unpaid balance, out of the net revenues accruing from the renting of the additional housing units to be constructed and beginning with the time when existing indebtedness on the existing housing units is retired, also out of the net revenues from such existing units.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that to provide more concrete evidence of the obligation of the school to the Trustees of the Guggenheim fund, the President of the school is authorized and instructed to proceed with the issuance of four per cent (4%) bonds in denominations of \$1,000.00 to be secured only by the undertaking of the Board of Trustees of the school to rent and maintain all of the housing units in the Mines Park project and to pledge the net revenues therefrom (after the retirement of existing bonds) to the reduction of the bonded indebtedness to the Trustees of the Guggenheim fund at as rapid a rate as is consistent with good management of the Mines Park project.

The proposed contract with Breffel and Moorman was reviewed and discussed. Mr. Steinhauer stated that the contract had been carefully examined by him with the help of Mr. Jancic and Mr. Earhart and that it seemed to be in good order. It was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that Mr. Thomas, as President of the Board, be authorized to sign the contract, said contract dated May 3, 1954, in total amount of \$106,766.00.

It was further moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that President Vanderwilt be authorized to proceed with arrangements for site preparations, utilities, surveying, landscaping, and other work necessary for the proposed new housing at Mines Park covered in the contract with Breffle and Moorman.

President Vanderwilt distributed two pages of vital statistics of the graduating class of 1954 for the interest and information of the members of the Board.

Mr. Bowen left the meeting at 3:20 p.m.

The summer operation of the Dining Hall was discussed. It was mutually agreed that the Dining Hall should be operated during the summer months as in the past.

The program for the dedication of Alderson Hall scheduled for May 24, 1954 was reviewed.

President Vanderwilt read and commented on a recommendation by Dr. Truman H. Kuhn, Dean of the Graduate School, on the establishment of a Graduate Faculty to be charged with certain duties and responsibilities covering graduate work at the school. The Graduate Faculty would include those members of the regular faculty who participate in the graduate program; however, members of the Graduate Faculty would continue as members of the regular faculty. After a full discussion,

it was mutually agreed to appoint a Graduate Faculty which would be responsible for providing graduate instruction as is provided for in like colleges and technical schools of high grade and national standing and which would recommend to the Board each candidate who is properly qualified for a diploma for the advanced degree. The Board suggested to President Vanderwilt that he prepare for the consideration of the Board a list of qualified persons he wished to recommend for appointment as members of the Graduate Faculty for the 1954-55 school year.

Dr. Parker reviewed a letter dated May 6, 1954 which he had received from Mr. R. C. (Chuck) Earlegher on the general subject of BCPD accreditation and curricula at the Colorado School of Mines. He referred to a similar inquiry which had been received earlier in the year by Mr. Russell M. Volk from Mr. M. E. Chapman. Mr. Volk, after conferring with Messrs. Parker and Stockmar, had replied to Mr. Chapman's inquiry with a copy going to President Vanderwilt which was then read for the information of the Board. It was mutually agreed that the interest shown on behalf of the alumni was commendable and that every effort should be made to provide the information desired. President Vanderwilt then outlined the studies of the curricula being made by the Curriculum Committee and Dean Signer. President Vanderwilt explained that a summary statement was being prepared to show (1) factual information on the changes in the curricula over the past 15 to 20 years, and (2) possible revisions that were under consideration for the school year 1955-56. It was planned to send the summary statement to alumni such as Earlegher and Chapman who had made or might make inquiries. Dr. Parker stated that he would make further acknowledgment to Mr. Earlegher advising him that his letter had been reviewed before the Board of Trustees. It was mutually agreed that the summary statement referred to by President Vanderwilt should be prepared as soon as possible and copies be made available for distribution.

Mr. Wimpress entered the meeting to give a brief review of his conference with Mr. Thomas A. Gonser in Chicago on May 6, 1954. Mr. Wimpress explained that Mr. Gonser did not have a set program, but his general procedure was to meet for discussion with the Board of Trustees, the faculty, and possibly alumni, before deciding on a plan best suited for the school. In the final analysis, the program to be followed was dependent upon what the school wished to undertake. Mr. Gonser estimated that an adequate program could be carried on at an annual cost of around \$15,000 to \$20,000. The members of the Board were unanimous in their feeling that a fund-raising program on a long-range basis should be initiated and it was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that the Colorado School of Mines Foundation, Inc. be advised that the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines favored the initiation of a fund-raising program and that it would cooperate in every way with the Colorado School of Mines Foundation, Inc. should it decide to employ the firm, Gonser and Gerber, as consultants in connection with a fund-raising program.

It was mutually agreed that a survey of administrative procedures by an outside firm was not feasible at this time.

President Vanderwilt announced the meeting of the "Mines" Alumni Council at 6:00 p.m., Wednesday, May 19, at the Argonaut Hotel and that each member of the Board of Trustees would receive an invitation to attend this meeting. The meeting was arranged

by Mr. William Traver, President of the Colorado School of Mines Alumni Association, and he expected about 20 representatives of the Alumni Association and the school to attend.

The meeting adjourned at 5:20 p.m.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting and presented the monthly statements as follows: Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of May 31, 1954; Mill Levy Building Fund Statement as of May 31, 1954; Special Building Fund Statement as of May 31, 1954; Dining Hall Statement for period from April 26 through May 27, 1954; Statement of Income and Expense, Canteen, period April 27 through May 26, 1954; Statement of Income and Expense, Mines Park, May, 1954; Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector Park, May, 1954; Balance Sheet, May 31, 1954; Trial Balance, 1953-54; Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Incorporated; Summary of Budget Receipts for Infirmary for period September 10, 1953 - May 28, 1954; Statement, Bradford Hall Dormitory as of May 31, 1954; Mines Park Addition Fund, May 31, 1954; and Summary of Estimated Budget Appropriation and Disbursements for 1954-55.

Consideration was given to an honorarium to be presented to Dr. Arthur S. Adams for delivering the Commencement address. It was agreed that an honorarium in the amount of \$225 should be paid to Dr. Adams from the school funds.

A statement of monthly cash balances of restricted funds for the period June 30, 1953 to May 31, 1954 was presented and discussed. It was mutually agreed that the record indicated that the balances were sufficient to permit placing an amount of \$10,000 at interest. Depositories suggested were Midland Federal Savings and Loan Association and the Industrial Federal Savings in Denver, Colorado.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the schedule suggested by Mr. Robert K. Fuller for construction of the Pilot Plant (Unit Operations Building) as follows: preparation of specifications to be completed by August 1, 1954; invitations to bidders, etc., 30 days with initiation of construction on September 1, 1954, and 6 months required for construction.

In accordance with action taken by the Board of Trustees on August 14, 1953, Mr. Steinhauer was authorized to transfer Canteen Surplus to the Athletic Association.

Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the Student Health and Accident Plan and called attention to excess income over expense as of May 28, 1954 as \$7,422.78. President Vanderwilt read a letter of June 9, 1954, addressed to him by Pat Dennis, Secretary of the Student Health and Accident Plan of the Colorado School of Mines, presenting a recommendation to the Board of Trustees that in view of the surplus to be realized in the 1953-54 school year the health fee be reduced from \$11 to \$10 per semester; the recommendation being based on a motion duly made, seconded, and unanimously passed by the Claims Committee of the Student Health and Accident Plan on May 21, 1954. In the discussion that followed, it was pointed out that no allowance was made during the 1953-54 school year for depreciation reserve, utilities, and janitor service. It was also pointed out that when the health plan was originally organized, it was discussed and generally understood that a reasonable excess for the future infirmary would be desirable. Action on the recommendation for reduction of the health fee was tabled for consideration at a future meeting of the Board when a quorum was present.

Mr. Steinhauer called attention to the Mines Park Addition Fund statement of estimated expenditures presented for the first time with the monthly statements to show progress of construction of 8 new housing units at Mines Park. The Mines Park Addition Fund would be a part of the monthly statements in the future.

The Summary of Estimated Budget Appropriation and Disbursements for 1954-55 were distributed and reviewed by Mr. Steinhauer. Attention was called to the fact that no allowance was made in the budget for remodeling of Guggenheim Hall which was anticipated for the year 1954-55 and that the estimated balance for June 30, 1955 was small. Mr. Steinhauer explained that the estimated balance for July 1, 1953 proved to be less than was anticipated a month ago and, in addition, outstanding orders were greater and that because of these two factors it was decided to exclude from the school budget the sum of \$25,000 originally estimated for remodeling of Guggenheim Hall and in addition to reduce the estimated balance for June 30, 1955 to the figures shown on the budget sheet. It was agreed that copies of the budget sheet should be sent to the members of the Board who were not present.

Mr. Steinhauer explained that an approved budget had to be presented not later than July 1, 1954 for authorization of payroll, new orders, and approval of current bills for the fiscal year July 1, 1954 to June 30, 1955. The need for a special meeting of the Board of Trustees was considered. It was mutually agreed that this would not be necessary and that Mr. Steinhauer should submit the budget as presented and reviewed by him to the Comptroller's Office as the operating budget for the fiscal year 1954-55.

President Vanderwilt reviewed the general terms and conditions of the D. A. Barry bequest under which the Colorado School of Mines Foundation, Incorporated would receive, for a scholarship program, the entire estate of D. A. Barry who died on June 8, 1954. Mr. Frank L. Jones, Attorney at Idaho Springs, Colorado, had deposited the will with Judge William E. Walther, County Judge for Clear Creek County. The will was deposited on the afternoon of June 10, 1954. Because the will did not provide for the appointment of an executor, Mr. Jones had suggested, and Judge Walther seemed to concur, that a person representing the Colorado School of Mines was desirable as an executor. It was agreed that Mr. Steinhauer should act in this capacity and President Vanderwilt was instructed to inform Mr. Jones that the school wished to have Mr. Jones recommend Mr. Steinhauer for the consideration of the Court as Executor of the D. A. Barry estate to be recorded at Idaho Springs, Colorado.

The meeting recessed for lunch during which the D. A. Barry bequest and its implications were fully discussed. Following lunch the meeting adjourned, and Mr. Thomas with Messrs. Vanderwilt and Steinhauer visited and reviewed the newly-graded intramural field and the construction at Mines Park, the Wood Shop, and the new Library, and Bradford Hall.

The minutes of the April 9, 1954 and the May 14, 1954 meetings were read and approved.

The minutes of the June 11, 1954 meeting which was held without a quorum were reviewed and the actions recorded were confirmed.

President Vanderwilt reported that a resolution recorded in the Board minutes of May 28, 1953 accepted an offer of a gift by Dr. B. H. Fastall with the definite implication that a gift was imminent, but that no gift had been received. It was the opinion of the Board that a notation be affixed to the minutes of May 28, 1953 referring to the above report.

President Vanderwilt reported that the Bradford Fund consisted of donations Mr. A. Hartwell Bradford had deposited with the school for ultimate use of the school in amounts as follows:

December 29, 1949	-	\$10,000
October 18, 1950	-	5,000
May 17, 1951	-	5,000
May 23, 1952	-	5,000

The Board of Trustees confirmed the transfer authorized by Mr. A. Hartwell Bradford of the Bradford Fund in the amount of \$25,710.66 made on July 31, 1952 to the Colorado School of Mines Foundation, Incorporated. The amount of \$710.66 was the amount of interest earned on the principal sum of \$25,000. Subsequent donations received from Mr. Bradford were placed in the Colorado School of Mines Foundation, Incorporated at the time they were received.

A letter of June 18, 1954 from Mr. A. Hartwell Bradford expressing his appreciation to the Board of Trustees for naming the new dormitory, Bradford Hall, in his honor was presented to the members of the Board for their information.

Dr. Parker and Mr. Harrison reviewed the status of the plans for the plaques for Bradford Hall, the new dormitory, and the Arthur W. Lakes ~~Hall~~, the new library.

Library
It was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that Miss Mary Hoyt be named Librarian Emeritus and that consideration be given to naming a room in the new library in her honor as a memorial. It was further agreed that a public announcement of the Board's action should be made as a part of the dedication ceremonies of the Arthur W. Lakes ~~Hall~~. It was agreed that President Vanderwilt should acquaint Miss Hoyt of the action and plans of the Board of Trustees.

Library
Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting and presented the monthly statements as follows: Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of June 30, 1954; Balance Sheet, June 30, 1954; Mill Levy Building Fund, as of June 30, 1954; Special Building Fund, as of June 30, 1954; Dining Hall Statement for period May 27, 1954 through June 30, 1954; Statement of Income and Expense, Canteen, period from May 26 through June 18, 1954; Statement of Income and Expense, Mines Park, June, 1954; Statement of Income and Expense, Prospector Park, June, 1954; Trial Balance, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc., June 30, 1954; Summary of Budget Receipts for Infirmary,

September 10, 1953 to June 30, 1954; Mines Park Addition Fund, as of June 30, 1954; Bradford Hall Dormitory Statement, as of June 30, 1954; and Summary of Expenditures, Alderson Hall, as of June 30, 1954.

Dr. Parker raised the question of acquiring the survey area now being used under lease from the Industrial School for Boys. President Vanderwilt stated this had been discussed with Professor Kelly, Head of the Civil Engineering Department, and Professor Kelly had agreed to prepare maps showing the area that was needed for the survey course. It was agreed that an effort should be made to have Mr. J. Price Briscoe visit the area at a time it was occupied by student surveyors and that plans should be made for obtaining title, if possible, at the coming session of the Legislature.

The student health program was reviewed and discussed. Further consideration was given to the recommendation to reduce the student health fee in accordance with a letter of June 9, 1954 presented by Pat Dennis, Secretary of the Student Health and Accident Plan, and introduced to the Board at its meeting on June 11, 1954. It was mutually agreed that the record of one year of the new plan was insufficient for final conclusion as to the ultimate cost of the program, and further that the indicated surplus for the current year 1953-54 was not a logical basis for reduction of health fees because certain items of cost had not been charged against the program. In the discussion that followed it was brought out that more information was desired as to the long-range plans for an infirmary building and student health program and the amount of money that would be necessary.

It was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that no reduction in fees be approved and that the student health budget for 1954-55 show allowances for utilities, janitor service, a reasonable depreciation, and other items that normally go into cost of operation of the student health plans.

A letter of July 2, 1954 from the Empire Construction Company by Harold B. Joy was introduced. The letter gave notice of a delay in the completion of the contract because of strikes. Mr. Steinhauer stated that in his conversations with Mr. Harold Earhardt he was advised that the strikes had not as yet affected progress on the new dormitory. It was agreed that the architects should be requested to review the situation with the Empire Construction Company to determine the actual situation and that the notice of July 2, 1954 by the Empire Construction Company should be acknowledged taking into account the recommendations that might be received from the architects.

Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the information received concerning the installation of gas lines to the 8 new units at Mines Park. It was decided to install individual gas meters for the 8 new houses.

Mr. Steinhauer reported that a balance of \$66,517.02 was available under the petroleum building project for construction of the Pilot Plant, or Unit Operations Building. It was mutually agreed that the architects should be advised as soon as possible as to the available balance.

The meeting recessed for lunch. The members of the Board were joined by Mr. Wimpress, Mr. Steinhauer, and President Vanderwilt. During lunch a review was given of the conferences held with Mr. Thomas A. Gonsor on June 6 and 7 concerning plans for fund raising. Mr. Gonsor

had recommended preparation of a blueprint, with the active participation of the faculty, to set forth the work being done by the school, why this work is being done, and to obtain recommendations for objectives to be reached by 1974 (the 100th anniversary of the school), and the progress that should be made during the first five years of this program. President Vanderwilt stated that Dean Signer, Mr. Wimpress, and he agreed with Mr. Conser's recommendations. Mr. Wimpress explained the organization chart for the program and expressed concurrence with the view expressed by Mr. Conser that the work should proceed without delay. After full discussion, the Board unanimously approved the plan and President Vanderwilt was instructed to proceed accordingly.

The meeting was resumed in the President's Office. On motion, duly seconded, and unanimously passed the following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLVED that Thomas S. Harrison and Max W. Bowen, Vice President and Secretary respectively of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines be and they are hereby authorized to rent from the Colorado National Bank (Safe Deposit Vaults), upon such terms as they may see fit to agree to, a safe in the Safe Deposit Vaults of said Bank for the use of the school, and that John W. Vanderwilt, Lester C. Thomas, Ben H. Parker, Gurnett Steinhauer, and Ted P. Stockmar are hereby appointed agents of the school, and they, or any two of them, shall have the right of access to said safe; to remove its contents and to surrender the safe and to release the liability connected therewith, and to receive refund of any money due for return of keys or otherwise.

RESOLVED that the Treasurer of the Colorado School of Mines be and he is hereby authorized and directed to rent for this corporation a safe in the Safe Deposit Vaults of The First National Bank of Denver, and to sign in behalf of the Corporation a lease therefor, and upon the termination thereof, to surrender said safe, release the said bank from any liability in connection therewith, return the keys, and receive any refund of money which may be due, and otherwise take such steps as may be necessary to terminate the said lease and all matters connected therewith;

The athletic department budget for 1954-55 was presented and reviewed. It was noted that the budget allowed for a minimum balance at the end of the year. On motion duly seconded and unanimously passed, the athletic department budget for 1954-55 was approved as presented.

Motion was made, seconded, and unanimously passed that President Vanderwilt and Mr. Steinhauer be authorized to sell as needed bonds now credited to the Randall Dormitory Fund for the purchase of furniture for the new dormitory, Bradford Hall.

President Vanderwilt introduced the possibility of the purchase of the C. E. Davidson residence at 1000 Sixteenth Street in Golden. This residence occupies the corner opposite from the Fertig house purchased by the school a few years ago and would place the school in a more favorable position for acquiring this block for its long-range program. The original price asked for the house was \$18,000, but Mr. Davidson had offered the house to the school at \$16,500. Mr. Steinhauer stated that unencumbered reserves in the Randall Dormitory Fund were sufficient to cover the purchase of the property. It was agreed that the price asked was reasonable and after considerable discussion, it was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that President Vanderwilt be authorized to offer \$15,000 cash for the residence and that he be further authorized to meet the requested price of \$16,500 if, in his judgment, this was necessary to purchase the property. It was understood that the purchase of the Davidson property was subject to the approval of the abstract by the Attorney General. It was the feeling of the Board that a reasonable appraisal value for the land should be paid from the General Fund of the school, and that the balance should be paid from the Randall Dormitory Fund.

It was agreed to hold the next meeting of the Board of Trustees on Thursday, August 12, 1954, at 8:00 a.m.

Mr. Bowen asked to be excused and left the meeting.
