

from his doctor. More recently, a copy of a sworn statement had been received in which Flanders had confessed the mismanagement and illegal use of funds.

In the discussion that followed, it was agreed that Mr. Flanders should be notified as soon as possible of the charges against him and that a hearing would be held in accordance with the stated terms (Paragraph 5) of his 1956-57 school contract.

Houses--Group 1, January 1957; C.S.M. Houses--Group 2, January 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park Addition, January 1957; Mines Park Addition, Summary of Budget Receipts and Disbursements, as of January 21, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses Group 1 & Mines Park Addition; Statement of Income & Expense, 1956-57 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc., January 31, 1957; Budget Period, 1956-57 Health and Accident Plan, January 31, 1957; and Athletic Association, Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements, as of January 20, 1957.

Property.

Barley Lease. Nothing new.

Mason Property. Negotiations still in progress.

McDermott Property. Mr. Steinbauer reported that the Golden Building & Loan Association, according to Mr. McDermott, had indicated a willingness to make a loan of \$16,500 on the McDermott property which was approximately 70% of the full appraised value. Mr. Steinbauer felt this could not possibly be amortized by rental. He therefore recommended that purchase not be considered at this time. The recommendation was accepted.

John Miller Property. The asking price of this property seemed to offer the possibility of amortization through rent. Therefore, it was the consensus that a further study should be made, and Mr. Steinbauer was authorized to arrange for an official appraisal by Mr. Burt of Golden.

Jameson Property. Mr. Steinhauer reported that sale of this property at 1612 Illinois Street was being handled through Mrs. Jenny Jameson's attorney, Mr. Robert Fleming of Golden, who had informed him that a petition was to be filed with the county court on February 4, 1957 requesting permission to sell this property.

It was decided that the school should continue its study of the possible purchase of this property and that Mr. Steinhauer should get in contact with representatives of Kappa Sigma fraternity to determine its interest and the possibility of working out a plan that would be of mutual benefit.

Maple Apartments. The asking price for this property was considered far too high to permit financing on a rental basis.

Hamberger Property. In view of the asking price, it was mutually agreed that further study should be made and an appraisal was authorized.

Railroad Right-of-Way Property. It was the consensus that an effort should be continued to acquire the two lots involved to fill out and consolidate the ground already owned by the school. In view of the complicated situation with respect to the title, it was not considered likely that an outsider would become interested in this property and that the school could not afford to offer more than a minimum amount. Mr. Steinhauer was asked to review this further with Mrs. Jameson's attorney.

The meeting adjourned at noon.

Minutes. The minutes of the regular meeting of February 8, 1957 were reviewed and approved.

Commencement Speaker. President Vanderwilt read a letter from M. P. Malozemoff in which he accepted the invitation extended to give the address at Commencement on May 24, 1957.

In recognition of Mr. Malozemoff's achievements in the field of the mineral industries and his interest and willingness to serve as principal speaker at the Commencement exercises, President Vanderwilt was authorized to advise Mr. Malozemoff that the Board of Trustees desired, subject to his concurrence, to have conferred upon him, an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Engineering at Commencement exercises, May 24, 1957.

Medalists for 1957. The persons selected and approved to receive the Medal for Distinguished Achievement at Commencement on May 24, 1957 were:

President Vanderwilt was instructed to notify each of the candidates of the Board's desire to present the Medal and that it was the Board's wish that the presentation be made in person.

Proposed Post-Retirement Plan for Faculty. The possible desirability of a plan or plans for continuing relationships between emeriti faculty and the school was discussed. Among the possible plans considered were sponsored research through the Research Foundation, and/or basic research through the Colorado School of Mines Foundation. It was generally agreed that such an arrangement was desirable and could be justified only if its objective was in the interest of the educational program of the school, but not if the arrangement was more or less automatic and only to provide supplementary income upon retirement. It was felt that a plan based on real merit and ability could well be a strong incentive which would encourage the faculty members to do their utmost in order to be able to qualify upon retirement for the plan.

Mr. Stockmar entered the meeting at this point and participated in the discussion.

The plan was approved in principle with the understanding that each arrangement should be considered individually on its own merit and further that work under the arrangement supported by the Colorado School of Mines Research Foundation, Inc. should be of such nature that it might interest and attract support from private sources.

President Vanderwilt stated that he would plan to have one or possibly two proposals ready for review and consideration by the Board at its meeting in April.

Mr. Thomas entered the meeting at this time.

Delton D. Flanders. On February 12, 1957 a registered letter was addressed to Mr. Delton D. Flanders as follows:

"According to the records in the Office of the Dean of the Faculty, the last day on which you met your classes and performed your duties as Professor and Head of the Department of Economics at the Colorado School of Mines was November 16, 1956. Satisfactory explanation for this continued absence has not been received.

"Representatives of the CSM Federal Credit Union have presented to us a copy of your sworn statement admitting mismanagement and illegal use of Credit Union funds.

"This letter is to advise you that because of your extended unexcused absence from the school and because of mismanagement of funds, your faculty contract dated April 20, 1956 is being terminated.

"Salary payment for the latter part of November and all of December, 1956, was made to you in good faith on the strength of your word that you were too ill to attend to your duties. Because of lack of evidence after continued effort on our part, we are forced to conclude there has been misrepresentation and that salary payments made for the latter part of November and December, 1956 were not due you. You are, therefore, requested to refund to the Colorado School of Mines salary paid you for the last fourteen days of November, 1956, in the amount of \$263.33 and salary paid you for the entire month of December, 1956, in the amount of \$564.38, total sum due the Colorado School of Mines, \$827.76.

"In accordance with Paragraph 5 of the above mentioned contract, you are hereby notified that a hearing by the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines will be held at 10:00 a.m. on March 8, 1957, in the President's Office of the school for a review of the above charges. You are invited to attend this meeting to present any facts you may have that bear on the above charges."

In accordance with the above letter, a hearing was held by the Board of Trustees notwithstanding the fact that Mr. Flanders, although having been invited to attend, was not present.

The pertinent circumstances and facts pertaining to Mr. Flanders' repeated absences from classes, beginning early in November, 1956, and his continuous absence since November 16, 1956, were reviewed. His mishandling of Credit Union funds was explained. Among the documents bearing on the situation that were given special attention were the following:

A letter dated November 13, 1956 to Mr. Flanders from the late Dean M. I. Signer.

A letter dated December 10, 1956 to Mr. Flanders by President John W Vandervilt.

A letter dated December 19, 1956 to Mr. Flanders from Mr. Steinhauer.

A letter dated December 28, 1956 to Mr. Steinhauer from Herbert J. Smith, D.O., Mr. Flanders' doctor.

A letter dated January 28, 1957 to W. Lloyd Wright, M.D. from Herbert J. Smith, D.O.

A copy of report to Credit Union members entitled "Unfinished Business" summarizing the nature of the mismanagement of funds by Mr. Flanders as Treasurer of the Credit Union.

A sworn affidavit dated January 30, 1957 signed by Mr. Flanders admitting "improper and unauthorized disbursement of Credit Union funds which were made by myself and diverted to my personal use and benefit."

Minutes of special meeting of February 6, 1957 of the C.S.M. Federal Credit Union.

After full review and consideration of the evidence, it was moved by Dr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Stockmar, and unanimously passed that because of continued and unexcused absence from the school since November 16, 1956 and because of the mismanagement of Credit Union funds, Delton D. Flanders' contract with the school, dated April 20, 1956 be terminated and declared void effective November 16, 1956 and further that Mr. Flanders be advised immediately by registered mail of this action taken by the Board.

Ground Water Code. The desirability of a workable and fair state ground water code was discussed by Mr. Stockmar and he stated that, depending on action by current legislature, the school might be approached to participate in providing technical assistance. The responsibility of the school in this regard was discussed briefly and the general feeling seemed to be that the school should cooperate if an opportunity was presented.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting at this time.

Land Acquisition. Plans were discussed for financing the purchase of property on a basis of self-amortization of full value through loans from a building or savings and loan association or an insurance company.

Fraternity Row Development. On motion made, duly seconded, and unanimously passed, it was decided to have the school appraiser make an appraisal of each fraternity house, subject to the consent of the house association; and further, that payment for the appraisals be made from operating funds.

It was agreed that such appraisals of the fraternity houses would be desirable in connection with the study to be made by Pereira and Luckman relative to a fraternity row. In the discussion, it was pointed out that the fraternity groups, that is both the house associations and the student chapters, should be kept fully informed of the study being made and its progress relative to a fraternity row; further, that each fraternity group should be encouraged to give careful thought and initiate studies as to their plans for the future.

Mr. Stockmar asked to be excused and left the meeting.

Monthly Reports. Mr. Steinhauer distributed and reviewed the following monthly reports: Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of February 28, 1957; Balance Sheet, February 28, 1957; Mill Levy Building Fund, as of February 28, 1957; Experimental Plant Funds, Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of February 26, 1957; Dining Hall, from January 20, 1957 through February 20, 1957; Canteen, Statement of Income & Expense, covering period from January 19, 1957 through February 20, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park, February, 1957; Mines Park, Summary of Budget Receipts and Disbursements, as of February 28, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Prospector Park, February, 1957; Statement of Income and Expense, Bradford Hall, February, 1957; Statement of Income and Expense, C.S.M. Houses--Group 1, February, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses--Group 2, February, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park Addition, February, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses Group 1 & Mines Park Addition, February, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, from September 11, 1956 through September 10, 1957, 1956-57 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc., February 28, 1957; Budget Period, 1956-57 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc., February 28, 1957; and the Athletic Association, Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements as of February 20, 1957.

The meeting recessed for lunch at the school dining hall. Following lunch, the meeting resumed in the President's Office.

New Savings Account. The following resolution was unanimously adopted.

RESOLVED, that the funds of the undersigned be and the same are hereby authorized to be deposited or paid into a savings account in Capitol Federal Savings and Loan Association of Denver and that said institution be and it is hereby authorized to pay withdrawals until further notice to it signed in the name of this organization as indicated below by any two person or persons, whose signatures appear below. Said institution is authorized to supply any endorsement for the undersigned on any check or other instrument tendered for this account and it is hereby relieved of any liability in connection with collection of such items which are handled by it in accordance with customary banking practice and it shall not be liable for the acts of banks serving as its agents, sub-agents or others or for any casualty. Withdrawals may not be made on account of such items until collected, and any amount not collected may be charged back to this account, including expense incurred, and any other outside expense incurred on account of this account may be charged to it.

Dormitory Change Orders. Two change orders were considered as follows: Change Order No. 1 in reference to unstable soil conditions at the northern portion of the building, total amount \$4,350.50; and Change Order No. 2 to include changes requested by the owner in the laundry room and the rerouting of water service main and sewer line, total amount \$472.00.

Each of the change orders was certified under date of February 11, 1957 by Robert K. Fuller as "a true and correct statement of work to be furnished and installed by the Contractor, that the cost as stated is reasonable and just and that the said additional work has been authorized by the Owner."

On motion, duly seconded, and unanimously passed, the change orders were authorized and approved. Mr. Lester Thomas, President of the Board, and Mr. Max W. Bowen, Secretary of the Board, signed 6 copies each of the two change orders.

Surplus Property. The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, that Form No. F-14, SPA, Issue Sheet, of the Colorado Surplus Property Agency shall be spread upon the minutes of this meeting and that Ernest E. Waters, Purchasing Agent, John W. Pickthall, Maintenance Foreman, and Earl Dickens, Instrument Technician, be and they are hereby authorized as representatives of the Colorado School of Mines, to obligate its funds and obtain the transfer to it from said surplus property agency of surplus property upon and subject to the terms and conditions set forth in said Form and in its name and on its behalf agree thereto.

RESOLVED FURTHER that a certified copy of this resolution be given to the Colorado Surplus Property Agency and that the same shall remain in full force and effect until written notice to the contrary is given said surplus property agency.

Mines Park Budget. The Mines Park budget for the current year was briefly discussed. President Vanderwilt stated that consideration was being given to a re-appraisal of the rent rates in view of the fact that cost had increased considerably in recent years and also in anticipation of the final payments on outstanding bonds late in 1959. An important factor is policy on net income to the school which involves the appraised value of Mines Park.

Following a discussion, it was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that Mr. Steinhauer be authorized to arrange for an appraisal by Mr. John C. Burt to determine a true value of Mines Park.

A report with recommendations as to rental schedules for consideration by the Board at the April meeting was promised.

Pereira and Luckman Contract. The contract arrangement proposed by Pereira and Luckman was read. Mr. Steinhauer explained that work had been started on a topographic map referred to in the proposed contract and that it would be completed in about six weeks and that Otto H. Kilian, Project Manager of Pereira and Luckman, had stated that the work would not be able to start until the topographic map was completed and after receipt of the maps it would take between 8 to 10 weeks for the completion of the work. In the discussion that followed it was concluded that the areas defined in the proposed contract by Pereira and Luckman should be extended from Maple Street on the west to Illinois Street and from Eighteenth Street on the south to the alley between Eighteenth and Nineteenth Street and that Pereira and Luckman should be requested to include this modification in his proposal.

On motion, duly seconded, and unanimously passed, the proposed contract by Pereira and Luckman was approved, subject to the modifications referred to above; and further, that payment for the work be from Mill Levy funds, and

accordingly, the approval of the proposed contract was subject to approval by the Colorado State Planning Commission.

Property.

Barley Lease. Mr. Steinhauer reported that Mr. Barley had done nothing since a month ago and he doubted that further attempt would be made to obtain a lease. He suggested that the matter be dropped unless or until Mr. Barley initiated further action.

Mason Residence. Mr. Steinhauer reported that after Mr. Mason had accepted the offer as authorized by the Board, he had later decided not to sell at this time. Mr. Steinhauer said he would keep in touch with Mr. Mason.

Jameson Property. An appraisal of the Jameson residence had been approved by the court. The results had not been made known. Nothing new had transpired during the past month relative to the lots on Eleventh Street.

John Miller Property. In accordance with authorization given by the Board at the February meeting, Mr. Steinhauer stated an appraisal had been made of this property, also known as the "Pine Apartments", located at 1205 Twelfth Street. The appraisal was about 4% higher than the offered price. He continued that he felt the asking price was not out of line and therefore recommended purchase of this property if financing could be arranged for full amortization through indicated rental rates.

It was the consensus of the Board that an effort should be made to purchase this property, provided a self-amortization plan could be worked out.

Hemberger Property. An appraisal was made by Mr. Burt of this property as authorized by the Board at its February meeting, and Mr. Steinhauer reported Mr. Burt's appraisal was somewhat higher than the asking price of \$7,800 and he recommended that the school purchase this property if financing could be affected that would permit full amortization through rental.

It was the feeling of the Board that the school should attempt to purchase this property also and Mr. Steinhauer was asked to get in touch with Mr. Bromfield of Industrial Federal Savings & Loan, Capitol Savings and Loan, and Golden Savings and Loan and invite these groups, if they would be interested, to submit a "package deal" of the Miller and Hemberger properties combined. Insurance companies also should be approached in a like manner. It was suggested that Mr. Stockmar be asked to recommend the name or names of insurance companies. It was felt that the proposals received, if any, would provide information on whether a plan could be worked out under which amortization of 100% of the purchase price was possible.

Charles W. Wood Residence. A letter offering to sell the residence at 1200 Illinois Street received from Charles W. Wood was read for the information of the Board. In view of the relatively high asking price and also because the house was located on half a city lot, the Board decided not to accept the offer made by Mr. Wood.

Lura Hudson Property. This property located at 905 Thirteenth Street had been offered to the school some months ago for the price of \$12,000, but because the house had been condemned by the city, the price was considered too high and no action was taken. The agent has now offered to sell the school the property for \$4,500. After checking with Mr. Earhart, Mr. Steinhauer stated the house was not worth rebuilding and that the cost of wrecking and removing it would be approximately \$1,500. He, therefore, recommended that we offer to buy this property for \$3,500, since Mr. Burt had given an offhand appraisal of the two lots at somewhere between \$4,500 and \$5,000. It was moved, seconded, and unanimously passed that Mr. Steinhauer be authorized to offer \$3,500 for the property and further, that in the event the offer was accepted, operating funds be used for payment.

John Kerr Property. Mr. Steinhauer reported he had received a call from Mr. Kerr who stated he had check-appraisals for his residence at \$19,000 and \$19,500 and he felt he would have been able to obtain this price except for the fact that would-be purchasers were scared away because of the school's long-range campus plan. Mr. Kerr offered to sell for \$18,000 but would not accept the \$16,500 offer authorized by the Board previously. After a full discussion, it was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that Mr. Steinhauer be authorized to offer Mr. John Kerr \$18,000 for his residence, including all venetian blinds and carpeting, and further, that President Vanderwilt and Mr. Steinhauer be authorized to use their judgement as to whether payment of the land should be from mill levy funds or school funds, it being understood that fair value of the house would be paid from mill levy funds. It was further understood that the authorization to purchase was subject to the usual requirement of approval by the State Planning Commission.
