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Minutes. The minutes of the regular meeting of March 8, 1957 were reviewed and approved.

Faculty Salaries, 1957-58. Dean Truman H. Kuhn entered the meeting and reviewed the procedures and policies being followed to make the upward adjustment in 1957-58 faculty salaries made possible by the current legislative appropriation for 1957-58. Salary increases included a general increase on a percentage basis for all personnel with minor adjustments and merit increases. Administrative policies in relation to appointment and promotion which were presented in preliminary form early in 1956 and in final form in September, 1956, were the basis for the merit increases as presented. The over-all result planned was to raise the average faculty salary from \$5,524 to \$6,500 in accordance with the justification advanced during the 1957-58 budget hearings before the legislative Joint Sub-Committee on Appropriations.

In the discussion that followed, President Vanderwilt explained that the summary presented by Dean Kuhn had been reviewed in detail with full agreement on the logic and fairness of the conclusions reached. The general methods and policies used were approved in principle by the Board, it being understood that final recommendations for salary increases, including promotions both for teaching and non-teaching personnel, would be presented in final detail for further consideration of the Board at a later date, probably at a special meeting.

President Vanderwilt asked to be excused from the meeting at 10:15 a.m. to attend the opening of the 23rd Annual Engineers' Day program. He thereupon left the meeting and returned at 11:20 a.m.

Monthly Reports. Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting and distributed and reviewed the following monthly reports: Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of March 31, 1957; Balance Sheet, March 31, 1957; Mill Levy Building Fund, as of March 31, 1957; Experimental Plant Funds, Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of March 31, 1957; Dining Hall, from February 20, 1957 through March 20, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Canteen, covering period from February 20, 1957 through March 20, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park, March, 1957; Mines Park, Summary of Budget Receipts & Disbursements, as of March 20, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Prospector Park, March, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Bradford Hall, March, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses--Group 1, March, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses--Group 2, March, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park Addition, March, 1957; Mines Park Addition, Summary of Budget Receipts and Disbursements, as of March 20, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses Group 1 & Mines Park Addition, March, 1957; Statement of Income & Expense, 1956-57 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc., March 31, 1957; Budget Period, Associated Students of the Colorado

School of Mines, Inc., March 31, 1957; Athletic Association, Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements, as of March 20, 1957; and Summary of Loans from Colorado School of Mines, October 1, 1956 to April 1, 1957.

Prospector Service Budget. It was noted the Prospector Service expenses exceeded the budget allowance, and it was suggested that a review be made of the work being done under Prospector Service as a preliminary to preparation of future budget estimates.

The meeting recessed for lunch at the Holland House. Mr. Fenwick asked to be excused and left the group. Mr. Steinhauer and Dean Kuhn joined the Board for lunch. Following lunch, Dean Kuhn left the group and the meeting resumed in the President's Office.

Preliminary Budget, 1957-58. Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the budget estimate as of April 1, 1957 with the aid of an explanatory statement of April 2, 1957, previously addressed to President Vanderwilt. He pointed out that the budget estimate did not include tuition increases recommended by the legislature, but that it did include the salary increases proposed in the original budget.

The report on the general appropriation bill by the Joint Sub-Committee on Appropriations of the 41st General Assembly was reviewed by President Vanderwilt in so far as it pertained to the Colorado School of Mines budget schedule. The recommendations of the Joint Sub-Committee were given special attention, and particularly the recommendation that the Colorado School of Mines increase the tuition by \$10 a year for resident students and \$25 a year for nonresident students. It was the feeling of the Board that this recommendation should be accepted as a minimum figure in the final recommendation for the 1957-58 budget.

The amount of \$40,000 allowed by the Sub-Committee on Appropriations to provide for printing a text book was discussed. It was mutually agreed that this item should be included in the 1957-58 budget and that every effort should be made to accelerate the printing of the text book for payment of the cost in the 1957-58 school year, and if this were not possible to negotiate a printing contract which would permit payment of part of the funds and committing of the balance prior to June 30, 1958.

*Sub-Surface Geological Methods*

Mr. Steinhauer stated that approval of a final budget for 1957-58 by May 15 was desirable and that he planned to have the final budget recommendation for the consideration of the Board at the May meeting.

Mr. Fenwick returned to the meeting at 2:30 p.m.

Athletic Association Budget, 1957-58. The 1957-58 Athletic Association budget showing receipts totaling \$36,000, expenditures totaling \$35,009.59, and an estimated balance of \$2,500.61 as of June 30, 1958 was approved by unanimous vote.

Proposed Budget Estimate, 1957-58 Health & Accident Plan, Associated Students. The proposed budget for 1957-58 showing receipts totaling \$27,336.75, expenditures totaling \$26,276.76, and an estimated balance of \$1,059.99, was presented and reviewed. Consideration was given to the use of accumulated reserve to obtain a more favorable reinsurance premium. No action was taken, but it was suggested that an inquiry be made of the insurance companies as to such a possibility. The budget was approved by unanimous vote.

The Government hereby bids par, plus accrued interest at the rate of two and three-fourths per centum (2-3/4%) per annum, for the entire issue of Series B Bonds as advertised. The Government also offers to exchange all of the Colorado School of Mines Dormitory Bonds of 1953, dated July 1, 1953, bearing interest at the rate of three and one-hundredth per centum (3.01%) per annum, numbered 7 to 200, both inclusive of the denomination of \$1,000 each, aggregating \$194,000, now owned by the Government for a like amount of the above Series 1957-A Bonds, having a coupon interest rate of three and one-hundredth per centum (3.01%) per annum.

This bid is submitted pursuant to the provisions of the Loan Agreement, dated as of October 1, 1956, between your School and the Government, and in particular to the provisions of Section 3 thereof.

Relative to the dormitory loan, the following documents were presented in original and two copies:

1. A resolution authorizing the issuance of Colorado School of Mines Refunding and

Construction Bonds, Series 1957-A, in the principal amount of \$195,000, and Series 1957-B, in the principal amount of \$290,000, making covenants to insure the availability and use of revenues to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds, for operation and maintenance purposes, and prescribing other matters relating thereto, was introduced, read, and its adoption moved by Dr. Parker and seconded by Mr. Stockmar. The motion carrying with it the adoption of the resolution prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Lester C. Thomas, Ben H. Parker, Ted P. Stockmar, and Kenneth R. Fenwick.

NOES: None.

2. Group Insurance. President Vanderwilt reviewed with supporting explanation a resolution of the Personnel Committee of the faculty, adopted unanimously at the last faculty meeting, concerning an increase in hospital benefits from the current \$11.00 per day room rate to \$15.00. The additional premium for this increase for a faculty member without dependents is 36¢ monthly and for faculty members with dependents \$1.42 monthly. Half of the increase premium would be paid by the employee and half by the school. In addition to the increase in room rates, the increased premium would provide additional maternity benefits and all other benefits that are based on a daily rate. A total estimated cost to the school would be between \$60 and \$70 per month. Thereupon, it was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that group insurance benefits be increased as recommended, effective as of May 27, 1957, the beginning of the new contract year.

Metallurgy Building Change Order. A letter of April 8, 1957 by Robert K. Fuller of Fuller, Fuller, and Fuller, addressed to President Vanderwilt, was read. In this letter, Mr. Fuller recommended and presented supporting evidence for use of glazed brick wainscot finish for the metallurgy building at a total cost of \$12,203.78. The advantages of a nonstaining glazed finish for wainscot services as against painted enamel coatings on plastered walls were discussed. It was mutually agreed that the glazed finish was to be preferred and that Mr. Fuller should be advised that for future buildings, alternate bids should be arranged for in preference to a change order procedure at a later date. On motion, duly seconded, and unanimously passed, the recommendation of Mr. Fuller was approved and Mr. Lester C. Thomas and Mr. Ted P. Stockmar were authorized to sign Change Order No. 1 - General Contract Work - Project No. 210, prepared by Fuller, Fuller, and Fuller. Messrs. Thomas and Stockmar signed eight copies of the change order which also required approval of the usual state agencies.

Mr. Fenwick asked to be excused and left the meeting at 4:00 p.m.

#### Property.

Self-Amortizing Loans. Mr. Steinhauer reported that information obtained thus far had been unfavorable in regard to a loan arrangement on the Miller property at 1205 Twelfth Street, but that he had not yet completed his inquiries.

Appraisals on Fraternity Houses. Appraisals on six fraternity houses made by Mr. John C. Burt were reviewed. It was mutually agreed, subject to Mr. Burt's concurrence, to send the house corporations of each fraternity a copy of Burt's appraisal of its fraternity house.

Reinhard Property - 1035 Fifteenth Street. A letter under date of March 27, 1957 by Mr. John C. Burt addressed to the Board of Trustees giving the results of



his appraisal was read. Mr. Earhart's appraisal of work to be done on the property was reviewed. After full discussion it was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that Mr. Steinbauer be authorized to offer the appraised value of \$16,700 to the Reinhardts for the purchase of the property, it being understood that purchase agreement with Mr. Reinhardt be subject to the required approval of various state agencies.

Rowe Property - 1612 Illinois Street. Mr. Steinbauer reported that in accordance with the authorization given at the Board of Trustees meeting on April 8, he had submitted a bid on behalf of the school to Mr. Robert G. Fleming, attorney, for the conservator of the estate. To date no reply had been received in response to the offer.

Mines Park Appraisal. An appraisal of Mines Park made by Mr. John C. Burt was presented and reviewed, together with operating costs and prevailing rental rates. A tabulation showing comparative costs of maintenance, utilities, services, and water for Mines Park as a whole and for each type of unit on the basis of square footage was submitted. The possibility of decreasing over-all cost of operation was discussed. It was generally agreed that the appraisal value of Mines Park and particularly the value of the buildings should be the basis for determining the net income to be expected from this as a self-liquidating school project. It was suggested that a careful review of cost maintenance, utilities, and services be made in connection with the contemplated upward adjustments of rentals.
