illness of about three weeks in August. It was pointed out that the school had no stated policy relative to sick leave for the faculty, but in general followed the Civil Service regulations which provided for one and one-quarter days' sick leave per month, accumulative to a maximum of sixty working days. Following a discussion, it was agreed that sick leave for the summer session should also be accrued at the same rate as during the regular school year, but that a stated maximum accumulation was desirable. It was the consensus that a review of policy on sick leave, both for the regular year and the summer session, should be made in the reasonably near future.

The situation relative to Professor Coke was reviewed and since the period of illness was not in excess of normal sick leave accured, it was moved, seconded, and unanimously passed the Professor Coke should be paid his salary for the entire period of his illness from August 16 to September 4, 1957.

Lunch. The meeting adjourned for lunch at the school dining hall. Dean Kuhn, Dean Burger, and Messrs. Wimpress, Burdick, and Steinhauer also attended. During lunch the new student enrollment was discussed. Following the luncheon, the meeting reconvened in the President's Office. Mr. Steinhauer continued in attendance.

Examinations for Registration for Professional Engineers. Dr. Parker discussed the results of the annual examinations in basic engineering given by the State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Lan Surveyors. He recommended that such information be obtained as might be available on the examinations for an appraisal of the effectiveness of the school's curriculum in qualifying graduates for registration as Professional Engineers.

Authorized Signatures of the Board. Form S-3 (12-47) of the State of Colorado, Division of Accounts and Controls, listing authorized signatures of the Colorado School of Mines required for approval or certification of all vouchers issued against Funds 3025, 3026, 1933, and 4017 was duly executed, showing the following signatures:

Alcohol Permit for the Year 1958. On motion, duly seconded, and unanimously passed, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, that Ben H. Parker, President of the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines, be and he hereby is authorized to execute on behalf of the Colorado School of Mines, the application, Form 1447, from the Internal Revenue Service, for the renewal of Colorado School of Mines Basic Permit TF-COLO-26 for the use of alcohol, free of tax, for the year 1958;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Gurnett Steinhauer, Business Manager and Treasurer of the Colorado School of Mines, be and he hereby is authorized to execute on behalf of the Colorado School of Mines the application for permit to procure alcohol free of tax, Form 1450, from the Internal Revenue Service for the year, 1958;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that John W Vanderwilt, President, and Gurnett Steinhauer, Business Manager and Treasurer, be and they are hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the Colorado School of Mines the monthly report, "Record of Tax-Free Alcohol Received and Used," required by the Treasury Department of the United States;

That the signature of either John W Vanderwilt or Gurnett Steinhauer shall be sufficient to complete the execution of said report;

That the authorization granted by this resolution shall be effective as of January 1, 1958.

Proposed Budget, 1958-59. Mr. Steinhauer presented and reviewed a summary, as of September 13, 1957, of budget appropriations and disbursements for the year 1958-59. He pointed out that the CSM tax fund receipts estimated for 1958-59 probably would be increased slightly and that the figure to be used would be announced by the Controller's Office some time after the meeting of the Equalization Board, the latter part of September. The student receipts of 1958-59 were predicated on an estimated enrollment of 1160 students in the fall of 1958. In the discussion, Mr. Steinhauer pointed out that the actual student receipts derived from fall registration of around 1110 probably would be around \$45,000 less than the \$546,000 shown in the budget estimate for 1957-58, based on an expectation of 1200 students.

Principal increases in estimated budget expenditures for 1958-59 as compared to 1957-58 were explained as follows: (1) General and merit salary increases of around $6\frac{1}{2}\%$ for faculty; (2) Mandatory increases of about $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ for Civil Service employees; and (3) Increases in both maintenance and operation and capital outlay.

It was generally agreed that the personal services increase was reasonable, but the increase in capital outlay and particularly maintenance and operation was questioned. It was recommended that these be reviewed further.

Following a discussion, it was the general feeling of the Board that the estimated balance as shown for July 1, 1958 should be revised, taking into account actual student receipts for 1957-58 since this item is well below the amount estimated. In summary, the Board suggested the following: (1) Review and revision of the estimated balance for July 1, 1958; (2) Review and revision of maintenance and operation estimate; (3) Review and revision of the capital outlay estimate; (4) The obtaining of final figure of CSM tax fund from Controller's Office; (5) A special meeting for final approval of the 1958-59 budget.

Acceptance of New Dormitory. The following letter was read:

We recommend acceptance of the building, subject to all warranties and guarantees of materials and workmanship in force at the time of acceptance as set forth in the contract documents.

Mr. Steinhauer stated that representatives of the Housing and Home Finance Agency had inspected the dormitory on September 10 and had indicated that satisfactory completion had been accomplished. He also stated a resolution was required by the H.H.F.A. indicating completion and acceptance of the dormitory.

On motion by Mr. Stockmar, seconded by Mr. Coors, the following resolution was unanimously passed:

WHEREAS, contracts for the construction of dormitory facilities consisting of one building located at the Colorado School of Mines, in the City of Golden, Colorado, hereinafter called the "Project", were heretofore entered into between Colorado School of Mines, hereinafter called the applicant, and the Empire Construction Company, as General Contractor, and the Midwest Plumbing and Heating Company, as Plumbing and Heating Contractor, hereinafter called the contractors, and

WHEREAS, the project has been constructed by the Contractors and the Applicant's architects have certified that said construction is in compliance with the plans and specifications and all contract documents relating to said project, and has recommended that said project be accepted, and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the applicant has made an inspection of the project and has investigated the construction thereof, and is of the opinion that the contractors have substantially performed their agreements, and that said project is the school construction Project No. Colo. 5-CH-28(D), as described.

THEREFORE, be it resolved by the governing body of applicant:

That the Project hereinabove described and as more fully described in the plans, specifications and contract documents prepared therefore, has been substantially completed and is hereby, in all things, accepted, subject to the obligations of the contractors as set forth in such plans, specifications and contract documents.

That the total cost of the construction of the project is \$258,844.56.

Work having been completed within the time limit specified and in accordance with the provisions of the contract, no assessments for liquidated damages will be made and the right to such damages is hereby waived,

Property.

Davis Property. Mr. Steinhauer reported that the Davis property at 1530 Maple had been appraised by the school appraiser at \$14,150. Mr. Davis had offered it to the school at a purchase price of \$15,500. Mr. Steinhauer stated that the interior of the property had been extensively remodeled by Mr. Davis and was in good condition, but that the outside appearance of the property was poor because of a sagging front porch. He recommended that the school attempt to purchase the property at the appraised price of \$14,150. Mr. Steinhauer was authorized to negotiate with Mr. Davis for purchase of his property and enter into a contract of sale for the appraised figure of \$14,150, plus the rental to the owner for a period of six months after the date of the contract for sale, the offer to be subject to the approval of the required state authorities. The Board was in agreement that the purchase of the Davis property should be made from Building Mill Levy Fund.

Rowe Property. President Vanderwilt reviewed the circumstances that resulted in delay in final action on remodeling of this property. He stated that Mr. Earhart had been requested to make an estimate of remodeling the property to make it usable for rental to a private family. The total estimate of cost was \$1,675 to make the house rentable at around \$85 to \$90 per month. Doubt was expressed by the Board that this small amount of remodeling would be sufficient to attract desirable renters. After considerable discussion, it was the feeling of the Board that the use of the property should be further reviewed with the Kappa Sigma Fraternity for its possible use and if rental to a private family was to be made, the additional cost of replacing bathroom fixtures and kitchen sink should be considered.

Victor E. DeMouth Property, 918 Fourteenth.
Mr. Steinhauer stated that he had just received a letter
from Mr. DeMouth offering the property to the school at
a purchase price of \$20,000. Mr. Steinhauer stated that
he did not recommend purchase of the property because
the price was high and also because it was not in an
area needed in the near future. The Board accepted Mr.
Steinhauer's recommendation.

First National Bank of Golden. President Vanderwilt reviewed a discussion with Mr. D. T. Derringer, Vice President of the First National Bank of Golden, relative to the possibility of having the school's general account and payroll account transferred to The First National Bank in Golden, Mr. Steinhauer distributed to the members of the Board a listing of the school's commercial bank accounts, savings and loan bank accounts, and bank saving accounts. After some discussion, the Board decided that action should be deferred until a full study could be made of the situation.

The Board of Trustees met in special session on September 26, 1957 at 12:00 noon at the University Club.

Present: Messrs. Coors, Parker, and Fenwick.

Absent: Mesers. Bowen and Stockmar.

Mr. Steinhauer and President Vanderwilt attended the meeting. Dean Kuhn also attended the meeting.

Dr. Parker, President of the Board, presided.

The purpose of the special meeting was to give final consideration to the proposed budget for the year 1958-59.

Mr. Steinhauer distributed copies of the proposed budget and reviewed the changes made since the preliminary presentation on September 13. He explained that the estimated balance for July 1, 1989 had not been changed with respect to the decrease in student receipts because the amount was approximately off set by the unfilled faculty positions.

The final figure on CSM tax funds had not been obtained from the Controller's Office and the amount shown on the proposed budget probably would be revised upward somewhat which would decrease by an equal amount the Special Appropriations request.

After a full discussion, it was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that the budget be approved, subject to the CSM tax funds to be obtained from the Controller's Office.

The budget, including the correct CSM tax funds obtained later, is as follows:

On motion, duly seconded, and unanimously passed the recommendation was accepted and the appointments to the Graduate Faculty for 1957-58 authorized.

Boettcher Foundation Letter. Thermofax copies of a proposed letter were distributed. Mr. Stockmar stated that he planned a meeting of his committee at which time the letter would be considered.

DoGraw Lease. Mr. Stockmar reported that he had reviewed a proposed lease prepared by Mr. A. B. DeGraw's attorney, Mr. Roy A. Peyton, and except for one paragraph found it acceptable in accordance with the discussion between Mr. DeGraw and the Board during the September meeting. A revision of the paragraph in question had been submitted to Mr. Poyton who indicated that, in his opinion, the revision would be acceptable, but Mr. DeGraw was away and his agreement to the change had not yet been received. It was fully expected, however, that Mr. DeGraw would approve the suggested change. In the interest of saving time, It was the feeling of the Board that action should be taken on the proposed lease. Accordingly, it was moved, duly seconded, and unanimously passed that the President and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the new proposed DeGraw lease, subject to the revision proposed by Mr. Stockmar in his letter of October 2, 1987, addressed to Mr. Roy A. Peyton.

Mr. Stockmar said he would keep Mr. Steinhauer advised as to further word from Mr. DeGraw and/or his attorney, Mr. Peyton.

Monthly Reports. Long-Term Lease for Building Site. Research
Foundation. Mr. Steinhauer reported that the suggested
dollar per year rental had been questioned by the Attorney
General's office and in reply he, Mr. Steinhauer, had asked
that they indicate what would be reasonable. He stated
he expected to hear further from the Attorney General's
office soon and anticipated no difficulty in final arrangements for a satisfactory long-term lease.

Proposed Industrial Minerals Survey. Copies were distributed of a proposal for an industrial minerals survey of the State of Colorado by Mr. E. H. Crabtree, Director of the Research Foundation. In the discussion, the following points were brought out: (1) the use of Experimental Plant mill levy funds could be justified for an industrial minerals research program; (2) a two-year period for the completion of the work, plus the additional time required for publication might result in some of the work becoming out of date before it could be made available to the public; (3) publication of work completed and distribution on a monthly or quarterly basis should be considered, possibly along the line of Mineral Information Service by the Department of Natural Resources of the State of California.

The meeting recessed for lunch at the Holland House. Messrs. E. H. Crabtree and Fred Smith, Dean Kuhn, and Dean Jordan joined the Board for lunch. Discussion was resumed concerning the proposed minerals industry research. Mr. Crabtree was authorized to proceed with organization of his proposed industrial minerals research on the basis of his estimated cost, but subject to his further study of a plan for publication monthly, quarterly, or as reports are completed to make the results of the research available as promptly as possible. Mr. Crabtree was asked to present the results of his studies with recommendations in time for the further consideration at the November meeting.

The meeting reconvened in the President's Office.

Proposed IBM System of Accounting. Mr. Steinhauer reported on his studies relative to using IBM equipment for accounting work in the Business Office; in work connected with registration and recording in the Registrar's Office; in the compilation of statistical data in the Assistant to the President's Office; and in the Publications Office in lieu of an addressograph machine. The several departments involved had participated in the discussions and were now agreed that conversion to this type of operation should be considered.

The cost of the conversion would be a nonrecurring item of approximately \$2,000 and a continuing monthly rental of \$500 per month. In addition, it would be necessary to employ an additional person to be in charge of the IBM operation, and eventually it might be possible to replace two or three clerical employees. It is doubtful that an over-all dollar saving could be expected but a greater efficiency and more service would result. It was reported that requests for additional information on cost analysis, credit hour studies, and space utilization by officials from the Governor's Office and the Logislative committees were throwing an increasing load on the administrative staff and an IBM system would be most helpful in this regard. Mr. Steinhauer recommended and President Vandervilt concurred that installation of IRM equipment be planned and that conversion be made as soon as possible. If an order was placed by the end of the current year, delivery could be obtained on enough of this equipment that registration procedures could be placed on these machines for the fall term of 1958. Other procedures would be placed on the IBM as soon as possible.

Following discussion it was generally agreed that conversion to IBM probably would be necessary. The question was brought up by the Board whether rental of the IBM machines was more economical than their purchase. Mr. Steinhauer was requested to obtain cost figures on purchase vs. rental and also, to review the general use of IBM machines with Mr. Joe Coors before the next meeting and report further to the Board.

Status of Plans for New Gym. Mr. Fuller had reported they were unable to have the final plans for the new gym ready for consideration by the Board at this meeting, but that they would be completed in time for the presentation at the regular meeting in November. This, in effect, means that the beginning of construction has been delayed one month from December, 1957 to January, 1958.

Property.

Jenkins Residence, 306 16th Street. Mr. Steinhauer reported that recently Mr. Charles Jenkins had called him regarding the possible sale of his residence to the school. He asked that the school make an offer.

With Mr. Jenkins' approval, Mr. Burt had made an appraisal which Mr. Steinhauer stated he felt was rather high, but inasmuch as a 100 foot frontage is involved, he felt that this property should be purchased if possible. The results of the appraisal had been given to Mr. Jenkins.

In the discussion, consideration was given to the possible rental that could be obtained for the property, the effect on values of thenew jail being constructed immediately across the street to the south, and the anticipated cost of a new roof that would be needed in a few years. It was moved, duly seconded, an unanimously passed that Mr. Steinhauer be authorized to offer a maximum of \$15,000 for the property.

Davis Property. Mr. Steinhauer reported that the offer authorized at the September meeting by the Board had been made to Mr. Davis and a favorable reception was indicated by Mrs. Davis, but Mr. Davis had been away and a formal acceptance had not yet been received.

Rowe Property. As requested by the Board at the September meeting, Mr. Earhart had prepared an estimate of additional remodeling to include new bathroom fixtures, more linoleum, underpinning corners of the bathroom addition, and moving the furnace to the basement. A further analysis of the new estimate was necessary before a recommendation could be made and Mr. Steinhauer stated that this would be provided at the November meeting.

First National Bank of Golden. The question pertaining to transferring certain of the school's checking accounts back to the bank in Golden, discussed at the September meeting of the Board, was further reviewed. It was the consensus that a continuation of the present distribution of the school's checking account seemed desirable. However, the Board concluded that some further study would be desirable to determine if possible whether those receiving school payroll checks would find it more, or less, convenient to have the CSM payroll account in Denver or in Golden. Mr. Steinhauer offered to make such a study by analyzing the endorsements of the cancelled pay checks over a reasonable period and report to the Board at the next meeting.

Proposed Remodeling - Old Gymnasium. President Vanderwilt reported on results of discussions by Dean Burger with the Student College Union Committee relative to the use of the old gymnasium as a union building. An interest had been indicated by the students for use of the gym on an interim basis, that is for a period of from five to eight years, but not on a permanent basis.

Drawings prepared by Mr. Earhart's office of a suggested plan for the use of the old gymnasium as a college union were reviewed.

In the discussion it was pointed out that remodeling would dissipate student union funds, but that the
experience to be gained might be very useful in planning
a permanent College Union. A possibility of more extensive
remodeling as a permanent arrangement also was discussed.

The discussion brought out the need for a clearer understanding of the proposed use or uses of a College Union. It would be easier to justify and probably to finance a College Union planned for all college groups, including alumni, and in addition some community use.

It was mutually agreed the studies should be continued with maximum participation by the student groups.

Sign for Proposed Site of College Union. President Vanderwilt stated that consideration was being given to placing a sign to indicate the proposed site for the College Union, as shown on the long-range master plan of the school. The Board suggested that it be made clear on the sign that it represented only a "proposed" site.

Paintings. A report with recommendations by Mr. Steinhauer relative to preservation of certain paintings owned by the school was given by President Vanderwilt. The recommendations reflected the opinion given by Mr. John Pogzeba, an expert on paintings, following an examination of each painting. In view of the high values placed on certain of the paintings by Mr. Pogzeba, and especially the painting by Bierstadt, the painting by Mr. Howland, and the Hoffman murals in the Geology Museum, it was the feeling of the Board that the report and recommendation should be reviewed further some time in the future at a full meeting of the Board.

Distribution of Monthly Report. The monthly report on Prospector Service, CSM Research Foundation, Inc., for August, 1957 was distributed.

The meeting adjourned at 3:30 p.m., after which Messrs. Bowen and Fenvick proceeded to the Geology Museum to examine the Hoffman murals.
