New Faculty Appointments. President Vanderwilt reviewed the qualifications of two new faculty members. The Board approved the appointments as follows:

Dean W. Dickerhoof \$6,500 Assistant Professor of Chemistry

Richard J. Barton 7,200
Assistant Professor of Metallurgy

Advisory Group. President Vanderwilt stated he had visited with several persons about similar groups both in education and industry. The consensus was that an advisory group to be effective should be administered through the president and that leading faculty members should be informed in advance of the announcement of plans. The Board felt the important thing was to get a group working and since staff changes were imminent in the Petroleum Department, perhaps that would be a good place to start. Dr. Parker offered to review the names again and President Vanderwilt was asked to prepare a statement of purpose for consideration of the Board. The thought was expressed that it might be best to get the entire group together for the first meeting before it was divided into sub-groups for study of individual departments.

Patent Policy. Mr. Stockmar said he had read the draft of the patent policy and found several areas where the language should be clarified if possible. The suggestions were noted to be passed along to Dean Jordan under whose direction the policy was being worked out.

Committee on Education Beyond High School. Mr. Johnston reported on a meeting which he had attended as a member of the advisory group of the Committee on Education Beyond High School. He stated they were studying the question of granting degrees at extension centers and the trimester system. Upon inquiry as to the feelings of the other members of the Board on these subjects, the members expressed their approval of the trimester system but without full knowledge of the situation doubted the necessity of the granting of degrees at extension centers.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting at this time.

Monthly Reports. Mr. Steinhauer distributed copies of the monthly reports as follows: Summary of Budget Appropriation & Disbursements, as of June 30, 1961; Balance Sheet, June 30, 1961; Mill Levy Building Fund, as of June 30, 1961; Experimental Plant, Summary of Budget Appropriation & Disbursements, as of June 30, 1961; Dining Hall, from May 27, 1961 through June 20, 1961; College Union Fund, Summary of

Budget Appropriations and Disbursements, as of June 30, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park, as of June 19, 1961; Mines Park, Summary of Budget Receipts & Disbursements, as of June 19, 1961; Prospector Park, Statement of Income & Expense, as of June 19, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Bradford Hall & New Dormitory, as of June 19, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses - Group 1, as of June 19, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses - Group 2, as of June 30, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park Houses, 29-36 inclusive, as of June 19, 1961; Summary of Budget Receipts & Disbursements, Mines Park Houses, 29-36 inclusive, as of June 19, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses Group 1 & Mines Park Houses, 29-36 inclusive, as of June 19, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, 1960-61 Health & Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines. Inc., June 30, 1961; Budget Period, 1960-61 Health and Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc. June 30, 1961; and the Athletic Association, Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements, as of June 20, 1961.

Vivian Property. Mr. Steinhauer reported that on July 3 he had appeared in court to establish the date when the Vivian property would be required. The date of September 1, 1961 had been entered.

After the July 3 court hearing, Mr. Vivian filed a motion to dismiss the suit and the hearing on this had been set for July 17.

Mr. Steinhauer stated he had given a check in the amount of \$19,500 to the Clerk of the District Court in payment of the Vivian property.

Houses to be Razed. Mr. Steinhauer stated he had inserted an advertisement in the Denver Sunday paper to sell the houses on the half-block where the Science Building is to be built.

Science Building Estimate, Mr. Steinhauer reported that originally the architect had given an estimate of \$775,000 for the science building including all built-in equipment. This estimate was approved by the Planning Division. Later the architect submitted an estimate of \$70,000 for island tables and the electrical distribution systems. The administration objected to this separate listing of what they considered built-in features. The architect had been told that he must include these as built-in items and that if the bids come to more than the original estimate, an amended request would have to be filed with the State Planning Division.

Mines Park Addition Indenture. Mr. Steinhauer reported that when the site is prepared for the construction

of the new science building, two properties, income of which is pledged for payment of revenue bonds issued for construction of Mines Park Addition, will be demolished. In the CSM Houses Group 2 there are two properties which were purchased from Prospector Park funds. When Mr. E. G. Spurlin, State Controller, was out here he said he was going to recommend that the income from these two houses be retained by the school. Mr. Steinhauer recommended that these two houses, 1422 Maple and 1224 Seventeenth Street, be substituted for the two properties included in CSM Houses Group 1 which we will lose.

On motion, seconded, and carried, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Colorado School of Mines at their regular meeting held in Denver, Colorado on January 14, 1955 authorized the issuance of Colorado School of Mines, Mines Park Revenue Bonds dated January 1, 1955 in the principal amount of \$123,000; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees pledged the net income of certain houses purchased by the school to the repayment of the Mines Park Revenue Bonds which were purchased by the Simon Guggenheim Fund in the amount of \$123,000, among these houses being the following two properties described as follows:

Davison House - 1000 16th Street, Golden

Fertig House - 1020 16th Street, Golden and

WHEREAS, the two above-mentioned properties will be demolished and the site on which they are located will be used as a site for a new science building to be erected:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES, IN LAWFUL MEETING ASSEMBLED:

That effective as of July 1, 1961 the net income of the following two properties described as follows:

King House - 1422 Maple Street, Golden

Kerr House - 1224 17th Street, Golden

be pledged to the repayment of the Mines Park Revenue Bonds, it being understood that the Board of Trustees may authorize the demolition of either or both houses and replace them with any other structure whatsoever, the income derived from which need not be pledged to secure said bonds.

Attorney General's Opinion - Deposits in Savings and Loan Associations. Mr. Steinhauer reported that Mr. Spurlin had requested an opinion from the Attorney General regarding state agencies depositing money in savings and loan associations. The Attorney General had issued an opinion dated June 30, 1961 that this could not be done, except in cases of trust funds. Mr. Steinhauer recommended that we make no change in our deposits until such time as we have arranged with the State Treasurer for transfer of funds to the State Treasurer. The Board accepted this recommendation.

Clay Pit Area. Mr. Steinhauer reported on a meeting with the Planning Division at which the Advisory Board of the Planning Division recommended approval of the application for site preparation in the amount of \$70,000 and approval of the married student housing and college union application. They recommended approval of the fraternity row with the provision that the school make satisfactory arrangements to lease the fraternities the ground on which the houses would be built and instead of collecting rent apply the amount against the purchase of the present fraternity houses with the effect that the school would not be out any money at all. Mr. Steinhauer felt this would not be acceptable to the fraternities and further that several of the fraternities have property which the school does not wish to buy,

There followed a general discussion of the problems which had come up in connection with the fraternity row and the FFHA application for financing fraternity houses. Upon motion made, seconded, and passed, it was agreed that the application for a loan to build fraternity houses should be withdrawn.

Plans for Married Student Housing and College Union, Mr. Sudler, architect, entered the meeting with one of his associates and reviewed preliminary sketches and plans for the married student housing and college union. The Board gave Mr. Sudler unanimous approval of his sketches and plans.

The meeting adjourned at 4:00 p.m.

Previous Minutes. The minutes of the meeting held on July 14, 1961 were approved as corrected.

New Faculty Appointment. President Vanderwilt reviewed the qualifications of a new faculty member. The Board approved the appointment as follows:

Ernest Manfred \$4,800 Instructor in Basic Engineering (Engineering Graphics)

president Vanderwilt's Salary. Because action taken in May was inadvertently omitted from minutes, the Board reconfirmed a salary increase of \$800 per annum for President Vanderwilt effective September 1, 1961.

Presidents' Association. The work of the Association of State Institutions of Higher Education in Colorado was discussed and the budgets for the year July 1, 1960 to July 1, 1961 and for the current year were reviewed. In reply to a question raised by a member of the Board, it was explained that the amount paid by the Colorado School of Mines toward operation of the association was prorated on the basis of the relative amounts of appropriations received by each college.

Mr. Steinhauer entered the meeting at this time.

Monthly Reports, Mr. Steinhauer distributed copies of the monthly reports as follows: Summary of Budget Appropriation & Disbursements as of July 31, 1961; Balance Sheet, July 31, 1961; Mill Levy Building Fund as of July 31, 1961; Experimental Plant, Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of July 31, 1961; Dining Hall covering period July 1, 1961 through June 30, 1962; College Union Fund, Susmary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements, as of July 31, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park, as of July 20, 1961; Mines Park, Summary of Budget Receipts & Disbursements, as of July 20, 1961; Prospector Park, Statement of Income & Expense, as of July 20, 1961; Prospector Park, Summary of Budget Receipts & Disbursements, as of July 20, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Bradford Hall & New Doraitory, as of July 20, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses - Group #1, as of July 20, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses - Group #2, as of July 20, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, Mines Park Houses, 20-36 Inclusive, as of July 20, 1961; Summary of Budget Receipts & Disbursements, Mines Park Houses, 29-36 Inclusive, as of July 20, 1961: Statement of Income & Expense, C.S.M. Houses Group #1 & Mines Park Houses, 29-36 Inclusive, as of July 20, 1961: Statement of Income & Expense, 1960-61 Health & Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc.

July 31, 1961; Budget Period, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc., July 31, 1961; and the Athletic Association, Summary of Budget Appropriations and Disbursements, as of July 20, 1961.

1962-63 Budget. Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the proposed 1962-63 budget. It was pointed out that the teaching faculty salaries reflected an increase of 10 per cent over the level for the current year and that the nonteaching faculty salaries reflected an increase of 8 per cent over the current fiscal period. These figures were recommended by Dean Kuhn as a result of partial returns of a survey made by him on salaries at comparable institutions. Of this 10 per cent, 6 per cent was required to bring our salaries up to the median of the other schools while 3 per cent was proposed as a merit increase for 1962-63 fiscal period. This salary increase was accepted in principle by the Board.

Nonresident Tuition, 1962-63. It was pointed out that the tuition income shown in the proposed budget reflected an increase of \$50 a year for nonresident students. It was moved, seconded, and carried that nonresident tuition for the 1962-63 school year be increased by \$50 to a total of \$750 per year.

Health and Accident Plan of the Associated Students.
Budget, 1961-62. The Board reviewed the proposed budget for the
Health and Accident Plan of the Associated Students for the
1961-62 fiscal period beginning September 1, 1961. In view of
certain comments made by the State Auditor, the terms "Equipment
Depreciation" and "Building Depreciation" were to be eliminated
and the term, "Contribution to Building Fund" was to be used in
their place.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the proposed budget in the amount of \$29,888.56 as recommended for the 1961-62 school year be approved.

Transfer of Funds to State Treasury. The question of transfer of funds to the State Treasurer as recommended by the State Auditor was discussed. Mr. Steinhauer reported that he had reviewed this matter with the State Controller. Mr. Spurlin, and that Mr. Spurlin had requested the transfer at the school's early convenience. President Vanderwilt questioned the transfer of the CSM Houses - Group 2 funds stating that no provision had been made in our current budget for the wrecking of the houses on the science building site and that in his opinion, expenditure from the CSM Houses - Group 2 funds for this purpose was logical.

It was then agreed that President Vanderwilt and Mr. Steinhauer would consult with Mr. Spurlin before actual

transfer of funds and suggest the following with regard to these CSM Houses - Group 2 funds: (1) transfer of cash to mill levy building fund; (2) pay for demolition of the four houses before the funds are transferred; and (3) pay for the demolition out of the 1961-62 net income of this fund.

New Bank Account. Upon motion made, seconded, and unanimously carried, the following resolution was adopted:

ARSOLVED, That Gurnett Steinhauer, Treasurer, and John W Vanderwilt, President, are hereby authorized to open a savings account for the Colorado School of Mines Restricted Funds and to invest its funds from time to time with Mile High Savings and Loan Association and that said association is hereby authorized to act without further inquiry in accordance with writings bearing the signatures of these two officers, or facsimile signatures of these two officers, unless and until it has been notified of any change of officers and of further authorization for other individuals to so sign, together with a specimen of the signature of each such individual.

Science Building Plans. Mr. Steinhauer stated that he had talked with Mr. Kenneth Fuller regarding final plans for the new Science Building. Mr. Fuller reported that he would notify the school the first part of September as to whether these plans would be available for the September meeting of the Board.

Housing and Home Finance Agency Application. Mr. Steinhauer presented the final application to HHFA for a college union and married student housing project. This application indicated a total construction cost for the facilities as follows:

Of this amount, approximately \$200,000 was to be furnished in equity money by the school and the balance of \$1,450,000 was to be borrowed from the HHFA with repayment to come from the net income of the proposed facilities, plus the facilities under our existing bond issue with HHFA, plus the net income from the operation of Mines Park and that portion of Prospector Park that is being made permanent.

It was moved, seconded, and passed that the above plan of financing be adopted.

Beta Fraternity. President Vanderwilt read a letter from Mr. Carl Blaurock, president of the Crucible Fraternal Association, in which it was stated that the Beta Theta Pi house had been sold to Jefferson County and that it would be necessary for the fraternity to build a new house prior to the fall session in 1962. In the letter, Mr. Blaurock requested that certain matters be taken up with the Board of Trustees and that an answer to these questions be given at the earliest . possible date. The Board reviewed the questions as raised by the fraternity and instructed President Vanderwilt to reply giving the following answers: (1) The school will make no further effort to obtain government financing for the project; (2) Plans for each house must be approved by an architectual committee within the school, each fraternity house must house a minimum of 36 and a maximum of 60 men; (3) Construction must be of fire resistant material; (4) A house of three stories above ground may be built; (5) House mothers will be required; (6) Each fraternity will be required to lease the ground on which the house is built. A fixed sum tentatively set at \$6,000 would be paid initially by the fraternity. This amount would repay to the school the cost of obtaining the property. After the first year, a nominal payment of \$1 or \$10 a year would be charged: (7) The school would hope to have the site for fraternity houses completed by January 1, 1962; and (8) Each fraternity would be permitted to employ an architect of its own choosing.

Inasmuch as Governor McNichols has questioned the advisability of building fraternity houses on state land, it was suggested that President Vanderwilt contact Governor McNichols and inform him of the Board's decision regarding the construction of these houses on state land.

Weber Property - 007 Fifteenth Street. Mr. Steinhauer presented an up-to-date appraisal of the Weber property. It was the decision of the Board that this property could not be purchased at this time due to lack of funds.

Olmstead Property - 1202 Nineteenth Street. Mr. Steinhauer presented an appraisal of the Olmstead property. It was the decision of the Board that this property could not be purchased at this time due to lack of funds.

Request for Rezoning. President Vanderwilt read a letter from Mr. Robert Fleming, attorney for Mr. Ralph L. Bradley who is the administrator of the estate of Emile S. Calmett. Mr. Fleming asked that the school consent to a non-conforming permit for the south half of Lots 11 and 12, Block 102,

South Golden, which is the area at 19th and Illinois upon which the Frontier station is located.

This matter was discussed at length and it was the feeling of the Board that should the school approve this non-conforming permit it was very possible that the other three corners of the intersection at 19th and Illinois would be rezoned commercial. President Vanderwilt then discussed the possibility of purchasing the property immediately west of the Frontier station belonging to Mrs. Ada Olmstead in the 1100 block on 19th Street and also the possibility of purchasing the property on the northeast corner of this intersection belonging to the estate of Mr. Green, it being the feeling that if these two properties were owned by the school the possibility of the Frontier corner being zoned commercial would be more remote.

with a trust officer of the First National Bank of Denver who is handling the affairs of Mr. Green's estate and Mr. Steinhauer was asked to check on the possibility of obtaining the Clastead property and the possible source of funds for payment. It was also suggested that President Vanderwilt and Mr. Steinhauer check with Mr. Mark Watrous, State Highway Engineer, to see if some arrangement might be worked out for the Highway Department to acquire that part of Prospector Park which will be used for the intersection at 19th and Highway 6 in exchange for the Highway Department acquiring certain properties needed by the school.

The meeting adjourned at 3:15 p.m.

Houses Group 1 and Mines Park Houses, 29-36, inclusive, as of August 18, 1961; Statement of Income & Expense, 1960-61 Health & Accident Plan, Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, August 31, 1961; Budget Period, 1960-61 Health and Accident Plan. Associated Students of the Colorado School of Mines, Inc., August 31, 1961; and the Athletic Association, Summary of Budget Appropriation and Disbursements, as of August 20, 1961. Copies of the Financial Statement of Operation, July 1, 1960 to June 30, 1961 were also distributed.

Prospector Park. Following the presentation of the Prospector Park, Statement of Income and Expense, there was a discussion of the remodeling and maintenance of the housing units. Mr. Steinhauer reported that the remodeling on units originally approved for remodeling would be resumed this fall. President Vanderwilt reported that in a discussion with Mr. Steinhauer, the Chief Engineer of the Highway Department, Mr. Watrous, had stated that the Highway Department would not be needing for at least another three years the ground at the 19th Street-Highway 6 intersection upon which six units are located. Mr. Watrous felt that the school

should not defer improvements and that any added value would be taken into consideration at the time the Highway Department acquired the land. The Board asked that the units be maintained, inside and outside, as well as they can be maintained, within reason. The Board deferred a decision on improving units located on ground which will be needed by the Highway Department.

1962-63 <u>Budget</u> Mr. Steinhauer reviewed the major items in the 1962-63 preliminary budget estimate of \$2,643,480.

President Vanderwilt stated that consideration was being given to the addition of a line item in the 1962-63 budget for the purchase of certain specified properties in the area needed for future campus developments if and when such properties became available. Mr. Steinhauer pointed out that this would come under the statute enacted by the legislature in 1950, "An Act Related to the Executive Budget and Providing a Mothod of Budgeting and Planning for Capital Construction Projects." Under the statute, request must be filed by July 1 for consideration by the legislature the following January. The Board felt we should start now to prepare for such a request and in the meantime, the Joint Budget Committee should be made acquainted with our problem and an attempt made to include in the budget an item of 3100,000 for purchase of properties needed for our long-range planning.

The budget was approved with this addition.

Mr. Steinhauer was instructed to check with the State Controller about the possibility of transferring the surplus from houses purchased with mill levy funds shown in C.S.M. Houses, Group 2, to the Mill Levy Suilding Fund. This would assure immediate availability of these funds.

Dean Kuhn entered the meeting at this time.

Additional Undergraduate Degrees. Dean Kuhn reported that for some time he had been considering recommending to the Board the addition of undergraduate degree programs in chemistry, physics, mathematics, general engineering, and mineral economics. It was his opinion that such programs could be added under the Colorado statutes.

The thought was expressed that having reached a decision to form an advisory group for the review of the miss, purposes, and curricula of the School, it would be advisable to refrain from action until this group has been organized and has had an opportunity to study the situation.

Dr. Parker distributed copies of a list of names he had compiled and asked that each member of the Board review the list before the October Board meeting. President Vanderwilt said he would have a statement of purpose for consideration

of the Board at the October Meeting.

Dean Kuhn left the meeting at this time.

Services by the City of Golden. Mr. Coors reported on criticisms which had been made by Golden residents, particularly because of the property which was being purchased by the School and removed from tax roles. It was felt that the criticisms were in part justified in that the City furnished the School such services as police and fire protection and street repair. The Board asked that the administration explore the legality of the School entering some contract with the City of Golden for some services and also that the administration inquire of the other state schools as to how the situation is handled in their respective communities.

Meeting of the Boards of Control with the Governor. Mr. Coors reported on the seeting called by the Governor on August 31, 1961 to discuss policies affecting selection of architects for work at state institutions.

After thorough discussion of the subject of selection of architectural firms for any construction or planning project at the Colorado School of Mines, which project will be paid for by State funds, it was moved, seconded, and unanimously agreed that the following resolution be adopted:

RESOLVED, that careful consideration will be given to all competent architectural firms before final selection is made with the objective of spreading available business amongst different firms as far as practical; further, that no architectural firm will be asked to make preliminary plans, when such plans might obligate the School to that firm, until final selection for the project has been made; still further, that all selections of architects will be made with consultation and approval of the State Planning Division.

Fraternity Row. In the meeting with the Governor to discuss policy relative to hiring architects, the question had been asked about the possibility of leasing ground to fraternities. The governor had stated that such leasing arrangements would have to be approved by the Attorney General.

Mr. Steinhauer reported that the Beta Theta Pi Fraternity had their plans for their new house and were very anxious to know about the leasing arrangement. It was recognized that it would not be possible to enter into an agreement with the Beta Fraternity until such a lease arrangement could be worked out and approved by the Attorney General. Dividend from Group Insurance Policy. President
Vanderwilt reported on a proposal by Equitable Life Assurance
Society to establish a Premium Stabilization Fund which would
eliminate the possibility of a rate increase in the near future.
Mr. Steinhauer explained that the School's dividend credit
would be withheld by Equitable to establish this fund. After
a brief discussion, this action was approved.

Righway Department - Exchange of Land. Mr. Steinhauer reported that he and Mr. Lec Thomas had gone to see Mr. Mark Watrous, Chief Engineer of the Highway Department, about the possibility of selling the property now occupied by Prospector Park to the Highway Department so that the Highway Department would purchase property which the School needs in exchange. Mr. Watrous had later informed the School that it was not the policy of the Highway Department to purchase property in advance of need and that they would not need the Prospector Park land for another three years.

Wivian Property. The Board read a document which Mr. John Vivian had sent for signature in which receipt of the key to his property was acknowledged. Because of the language of the document, officers of the Board declined to sign. Mr. Steinhauer was instructed to acknowledge receipt of the key to the Vivian property by a letter to Mr. Vivian.

Calmett Property - 19th and Illinois. President Vanderwilt reported that in answer to an inquiry, the attorney for the administrator of the estate holding the Calmett property had stated the price to be \$35,000.

President Vanderwilt also reported that in accordance with instructions given him at the last Board meeting, he had contacted the Trust Officer of the First National Bank of Denver with regard to the acquisition of the Green property located at 19th and Illinois. The purchase price of the Green property was reported to be \$21,000.

The Board asked that further negotiations be made for these two properties and, since a source of State funds could not be found, that the CSM Foundation Board be asked to acquire these properties with Foundation funds, if agreements can be reached on price.

The meeting adjourned at 1:00 p.m.
